# Further Study Planned On Governance Issue

President O'Dowd reports that he will soon initiate a further study into the question of university governance.

This issue was a charge given one of the special commissions created last year to look at several aspects of the changing institution. After meeting many hours, however, the Commission on University Governance, under the chairmanship of William G. Hammerle, recommended that another group be formed to take a fresh look at the issue.

The University Student Congress also passed a resolution on Oct. 17 asking the president to reopen the study. Governance became an issue two years ago when the student mem-

bers of the University Senate resigned in a body from the Senate and from most of the various standing committees of the university. In the intervening months the students have formed their separate governing body, the Student Congress.

Governance also has been a continuing and growing concern with the AAUP as that group, through its year-old role as collective bargaining agent for the faculty, has moved into areas which formerly were in the realm of the University Senate. O'Dowd has indicated that a more effective way must be found in the governance structure to give all of the internal "publics" a voice in the decision-making process of the university.

## Student Grants Ready

The Alumni Council has announced that funding will be available for a second round of grants to outstanding undergraduates for independent scholarly projects during the winter, spring and summer sessions. Applications are sought under the following conditions:

Applications describing the work to be done should be submitted by Nov. 15 to the Office of Research Services, 370 Dodge (ext. 2077), where forms and advice also may be obtained.

Review of proposals will be done during late November by the University Research Committee, augmented by representatives of the Alumni Association. Decisions will be announced in mid-December.

All Oakland undergraduates who have earned 30 or more semester hours of credit are eligible to apply. Requests should be limited to \$200, with the funds to be used for appropriate supplies, services, travel, etc., connected with the scholarly project.

## Drug Programs Initiated

A group of Oakland students have established a new organization under the title "Polyphony" and addressed "to the full scope of drug use on campus."

They have set up a Resources Center in 100 Vandenberg, a "hot-line" for students needing help or information, and a "crash pad" for those on bad trips. A spokesman for the center said students with serious drug-related problems will be

referred to the Graham Health Center, Psych Services or elsewhere to doctors, psychiatrists, counselors, ministers, etc.

Temporary office hours are 4 to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 4 p.m. to 2 a.m. Friday-Saturday, and 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. on weekend nights. Plans are to extend the "hot-line" service to 24 hours a day.

The "hot-line" extension is 3564.



Tours of Meadow Brook Hall will be offered for the first time as part of the annual Parents Day program, to be held Saturday, Oct. 30. The tours will run from 1 to 6 p.m.

Parents Day also will feature panel discussions on "Student Life" and lecture-discussions led by faculty members. The sessions are duplicated in the morning to permit parents to attend both.

Participants also will be able to tour the campus throughout the morning and to attend showings of a film on Meadow Brook Hall, with the late Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson conducting a personal tour.

The formal program will conclude with a luncheon in the Oakland Center featuring a talk by President O'Dowd and entertainment furnished by the Collegium Musicum playing Renaissance music.

# Eye Research Work Cited

Several members of the Institute of Biological Sciences reported results of their research at two international symposia in August. V. Everett Kinsey and V. N. Reddy presented papers at a Lens Symposium in Utrecht, Netherlands, Aug. 20-27.

Kinsey's paper was titled "Studies on the crystalline lens, XVIII Kinetics of Thallium (Tl+) Transport in Relation to that of the Alkali Cations" and was co-authored by Ian McLean and John Parker.

Reddy's paper was entitled "Studies on Protein-Bound Glutathione in Normal and Cataractous Lens" and was co-authored by Robert Han, an OU senior majoring in biology.

Michael V. Riley presented a paper entitled "Synthetic Activity in the Corneal Endothelium" at a seminar on the prevention of blindness held in Jerusalem, Israel, Aug. 25-27. His co-authors were S. A. Hodson of the Institute of Ophthalmology, London, and H. T. Orr, another OU senior biology major.


