OU WILL CONDUCT COMPENSATION STUDY

Oakland University is beginning a study to develop and implement a uniform salary administration program. The Employment Relations Department will conduct the study with the assistance of Robert H. Hayes and Associates, Inc., a Chicago based management consulting firm. The new program will cover professional-administrative, and clerical-technical employees. The Hayes firm has provided similar assistance at a number of other universities including the University of Michigan and Michigan State University.

The study will include a review of the University's existing compensation practices, the development of a classification structure, and the establishment of a system of career paths. Although the study will take account of outside salary levels, the basic focus will be on internal equity, especially regarding women and minorities.

The work will require several months to complete. Reclassifications will be held to a minimum during the course of the study. Although all salary levels will be carefully reviewed, it is anticipated that the study will not result in a general salary increase. No individual salaries will be reduced as a result of the study.

ALUMNI SUPPORT UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH

The Oakland University Alumni Association is providing funding for a fourth round of research grants for outstanding undergraduates who have plans to pursue independent scholarly projects during the period from February to August, 1974.

Completed applications will be received until 5:00 p.m. on Dec. 12, 1973, in the Office of Research and Instructional Services, Room 288, Hannah Hall (Ext. 7-3222). Application forms and advice on proposal preparation may be obtained from Lewis N. Pino, director of the Office of Research and Instructional Services

All Oakland undergraduates who have earned 30 or more semester hours credit as of September, 1973, are eligible to apply. Awards will be announced in early February.

SOCCER TEAM MISSES BID TO NCAA DIVISION II MEET

The Oakland University soccer team has missed a bid to participate in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Region II tournament despite its 10-1-2 record at the time of team selection. Final games were to be played Nov. 16-17 on the road against the University of Notre Dame and University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

While OU had as good a record as some of the teams selected, it was determined that the level of competition for the Pioneers was not as strong as that faced by other contending teams, NCAA spokesmen said.

Going into the final games, Ken Whiteside and Armand LaComte had 16 goals and 13 goals, respectively, and they account for 29 of the team's 41 goals.

JUILLIARD STRING QUARTET APPEARS IN CONCERT NOV. 29

The Juilliard String Quartet will appear in concert at Oakland University Thursday, Nov. 29, in the initial presentation of the 1973-74 OU Recital Series.

The 8:30 p.m. concert in Varner Recital Hall is the only Detroit area appearance to be made by the famous quartet in a completely booked coast-to-coast tour. Tickets individually priced at \$5.50 and available at the Meadow Brook Theatre Box office. Students with identification will be admitted for \$2.

The OU program includes the Quartet in G major (K. 387) by Mozart, Bartok's Quartet No. 3, and the Quartet in C minor, Opus 51, No. 1 by Brahms.

In their 26-year history, the Juilliard String Quartet has attained prestige for an unvarying kind of performance, according to the New York Times: "precise, without eccentricities, flawless in musicianship, and attuned to every change of the composer's mood."

GRANT FIGURES AHEAD OF 1972-73 TOTALS

Twenty-three proposals for a total of \$676,255 have been funded for 1973-74 as of Oct. 31. Fourteen proposals were funded in 1972-73 for \$510,571 during the same time period. The information from Lewis N. Pino, director of Research and Instructional Services, shows \$148,008 received from research proposals compared with \$194,560 last year, \$455,072 has been received from education proposals compared with \$311,687 in 1972-73; and \$73,175 comes from development proposals.

EDUCATION LOBBY NEEDED, PINO SAYS

Lew Pino, director of the Office of Research and Instructional Services, gave a talk entitled "Nothing But Panic" at the 15th Annual Meeting of the National Council of University Research Administrators held Nov. 8 in Washington, D.C. Some 400 grant officers from around the country were in attendance. The talk stressed the need for a unified higher education lobby to represent and protect the interests of colleges and universities in their dealings with federal agencies and with Congress.
