**JACK WILSON APPOINTED
DEAN FOR STUDENT LIFE**

Jack Wilson, director of residence halls since 1971, has been named dean for student life at Oakland University.

He replaces Dudley Woodard who left OU in early September to become vice president for student services at the State University of New York campus at Binghamton.

Wilson's appointment was effective Monday, Oct. 14 and his selection followed a lengthy process of identifying, screening and interviewing the best possible applicants, Kenneth Coffman, vice president for student affairs, said.

"I am looking forward to working with Jack in his new position as dean for student life. He has provided excellent leadership and dedicated service to the university as director of residence halls and I have the utmost confidence that he will now effectively fulfill the many responsibilities of dean," Coffman said.

The 31-year-old Wilson joined the university's administrative staff in 1971 as director of residence halls. In 1973 he assumed the additional duties of associate dean for student life. He holds B.S. and M.A. degrees from Bowling Green State University and the doctorate from the University of Northern Colorado. Prior to his OU appointment, he was head resident advisor at Northern Illinois University from 1967-69 and an assistant dean in the School of Education at the University of Northern Colorado from 1969-71.

**MEADOW BROOK ART GALLERY
HAS YAMASAKI EXHIBITION**

An exhibition entitled "Minoru Yamasaki-A Retrospective" will be on display at Oakland University's Meadow Brook Art Gallery Sunday, Nov. 17 through Sunday, Dec. 22.

This exhibition has been made possible through the support of the Meadow Brook Gallery Associates and the Michigan Council for the Arts. The exhibition focuses on the aesthetic principles of Yamasaki's design together with his technical and engineering achievements.

In conjunction with the exhibition, Yamasaki will be honored Saturday, Nov. 16, at a reception and testimonial dinner at 6:30 p.m. in Meadow Brook Hall. Information may be obtained by calling the Meadow Brook Art Gallery at 377-3005.

Featured will be four 16th scale models: the World Trade Center, New York (8' x 7' base), Century Plaza Hotel and Theme Towers, Los Angeles (10' x 7' base), Commerce House, Seattle, Washington (6' x 4' base) and the Federal Reserve Bank, Richmond, Virginia (4'9" x 3'2" base).

Also, a display of 12 illuminated transparencies will be displayed. They represent the Northshore Congregation Israel, Glencoe, Illinois; Dharan Airport, Dharan, Saudi Arabia; McGregor Memorial Center, Wayne State University; and the Michigan Consolidated Gas Company of Detroit.

In addition, approximately 20 photographic panels, including the World Trade Center and the latest design of his own home will be shown. The exhibition catalog will include ten photographs of his most recent projects as well as his statements regarding his concern over our environment and contemporary architecture.

To enhance the content of the exhibition, the Meadow Brook Art Gallery has made a video tape of an interview with Yamasaki in which he reveals his basic philosophy through comments on various past projects. Simultaneously, his comments will be presented in a synchronized slide presentation in the gallery.

The gallery hours are 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and from 2 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The gallery will be opening from 7:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on evenings when there are Meadow Brook Theatre performances.

**O'DOWD SAYS LIBERAL ARTS
EMPHASIS REMAINS AT OU**

Oakland University's future is an optimistic one and the place of the liberal arts in that future remains secured, President Donald D. O'Dowd told the Assembly of the College of Arts and Sciences in his annual address to that body Tuesday, Oct. 15.

O'Dowd reaffirmed the university's goal as that of a liberal arts institution with strong professional programs.

The university will continue to grow, perhaps more selectively and slowly than it has in the past as it moves toward its goal of becoming a diverse, complex institution of medium size, O'Dowd said. Its objectives will be refined through such mechanisms as the recent St. Clair Inn conference and the completion of the management by objectives process underway in the university.

O'Dowd said OU's picture was one of the healthiest of any institution in Michigan and in the country. There are reasons for continued optimism, he said. At OU there is still the capacity for slow growth, capacity for change, much cross-departmental cooperation, a highly motivated student body, and a strong and young faculty with the flexibility to reallocate its resources and to respond to changing student needs.

During a brief question and answer period, he said the assignment of John De Carlo, vice president for public affairs, to work intensively as liaison with the legislature should help the university in this important area.

He also told the assembly that the core of the institution remains in the arts and sciences and that he saw no change in the basic location of arts and sciences as the central part of the university.

UNDERGRADUATES MAY APPLY FOR SPECIAL RESEARCH GRANTS

The Oakland University Alumni Association has provided funding for the fifth round of funding for undergraduate research grants.

Lewis N. Pino, director of Research and Instructional Services, said the applications will be received until 5 p.m. on Nov. 15 in Room 288, Hannah Hall of Science.

Undergraduates who have earned 30 or more semester hours of credit as of September, 1974 are eligible to apply. Applicants should request no more than \$200 in support funds with the monies to be used for supplies, services, travel or other costs necessary to complete the research.

Pino said all applications will be reviewed competitively by the University Research Committee.
