OU FACULTY AWARDED FUNDS IN COMPETITION

Seventeen Oakland University faculty members have won competitive awards from the University Research Committee. The small grant awards range from \$200 to \$600 each. The funds go for supplies and services used in the recipients' research projects.

The winners are: Amos Spector, psychology, "Information Overload Experiment," \$600; Sheldon Appleton, political science, "Study of Contemporary Society in Taiwan," \$200; W. Dorsey Hammond, education, "Reading Strategies and Recall," \$433; Peter Evarts, learning skills, "Ibo Poetry and Folk Narrative," \$500; William Bryant, modern languages, "Manuscript by Martin de Leon," \$320; and Dennis Callewaert, chemistry, "Evolution of Certain Dehydrogenases," \$500.

Awards were also won by Gottfried Brieger, chemistry, "Selected Sugars as Rodenticides," \$600; Brian Coyer, political science, "Indian and Mexican Wheat Growing Districts," \$500; William Forbes, biological sciences, "Nutrient Analysis of Several Seeds," \$300; and Cho Y. Liang, engineering, "Stress Analysis of Large Structures," \$600.

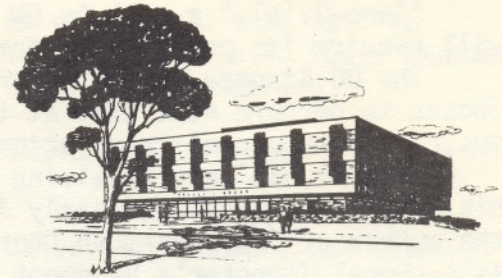

Dovaras has been receiving increasing attention for his efforts on behalf of early American music. He is the author of "Our American Choral Heritage." The work is a choral director's handbook of American music for the bicentennial celebration.

JAMES FITTING TO SPEAK ON MICHIGAN'S PAST

James E. Fitting, author of The Archaeology of Michigan and the first state archaeologist of Michigan, will be on campus Wednesday evening, November 19. He will speak on the prehistory of Michigan with special emphasis on the diversity of cultures and bioregions.

The program, "An Evening of Michigan Archaeology with Dr. James E. Fitting," is sponsored by the Sociology/Anthropology Club and the Archaeology Concentration, and will include an artifact display and slide show of the Oakland University Port Huron Archaeological Project of 1975. Admission is free, and the public is welcome. The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. in room 201 of Dodge Hall.

GLAUCOMA CONFERENCE HONORS KINSEY

An international Glaucoma Research Conference is being held November 16-19 at Marco Island, Florida, in honor of V. Everett Kinsey, director emeritus of the Oakland University Institute of Biological Sciences.

Attendance is by invitation only, and limited to 20 prominent scientists in glaucoma research. The program is sponsored by grants from the National Eye Institute and Allergan Pharmaceuticals Corporation, Irvine, California.

Participants include professors of ophthalmology at Harvard, Yale, the Universities of California at San Francisco and Irvine, Mt. Sinai School of Medicine, and Washington University.

The conference topic is "Ocular Transport Processes; Physiologic and Pharmacologic Aspects." Changes in this mechanism lead to glaucoma, and Kinsey has made outstanding research contributions in this area.

Venkat N. Reddy, present director of the OU institute, will discuss the subject of blood-aqueous and blood-vitreous barriers to amino acids as one of the conference speakers.

ZEPELIN ON TASK FORCE

An Oakland University psychology professor and expert on gerontology, Harold Zepelin, has been named to the State of Michigan Task Force on National Health Insurance.

The 26-member task force has been chosen to formulate policy recommendations to be submitted to Gov. William Milliken regarding an official position on national health insurance and its possible implementation in Michigan.

CONNELLAN DELIVERS PAPER

William W. Connellan, assistant to the president and director of public relations, delivered an invited paper at the University of Michigan-Dearborn recently. The paper, entitled "Media and Politics: Toward an Intervention Theory of Power," was one of a series of lectures at UM-D on politics of metropolitan Detroit.

Connellan has also been active in community affairs as chairperson for a Pontiac Area Transit Study Committee for the Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority. He was also recently elected treasurer of the Oakland County Tourist and Convention Bureau.

DURELLI TO LECTURE

An illustrated lecture showing the relationship between science and art will be given Monday, November 24 at 8 p.m. in the main auditorium of Cranbrook Institute of Science. The public is invited at no charge.

Guest speaker will be August J. Durelli, professor of engineering at Oakland University. Durelli's topic is "Log-Art" or "Artistic-Science."

Durelli is an internationally known expert in the field of materials and stress analysis.
