

## OU BOARD ACCEPTS GIFTS AND GRANTS

The Oakland University Board of Trustees accepted \$231,670 in gifts and grants at the Wednesday, October 22 meeting on campus.

In other actions, the board approved a \$35 special fee to cover costs of an education internship course. The board also established regulations that must be met before the university would act as a fee collection agent for any recognized student organization.

Two major grants were received recently from the National Institutes of Health. One of \$46,047 went to John R. Reddan, biology, for "Control of Cell Division in the Ocular Lens," and one of \$33,625 went to Arun K. Roy, biology, for research on "Hormonal Control of Alpha-2U Globulin Synthesis in Liver."

The U.S. Office of Education made a grant of \$100,754 to support the School of Education's teacher corps training program, and \$15,000 was received from Oakland County to hire an employee under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act. The Oakland County grant runs through June 30, 1976.

## "CONTEMPORARY REFLECTIONS" IN ART GALLERY

Works of 29 American artists are represented in the "Contemporary Reflections 1975" exhibit which opened November 9 at the Meadow Brook Art Gallery.

The exhibit is open to the public at no charge. "Contemporary Reflections" is sponsored by the Meadow Brook Gallery Associates. The show runs through December 20.

The works of 29 artists were selected from the Fourth Annual "Contemporary Reflections 1974-75 Exhibition" organized by the Aldrich Museum of Contemporary Art, Ridgefield, Connecticut.

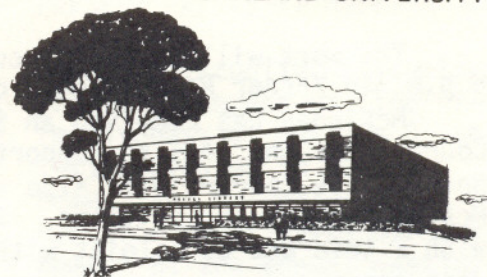
The aim of the exhibition is to represent the works of young talent or the emerging artists of any age who are making a fresh statement in their art, Kiichi Usui, gallery curator, said.

## "THE SEA GULL" TO OPEN AT STUDIO THEATRE

The Academy of Dramatic Art's upcoming production is "The Sea Gull," by Russian playwright Anton Chekhov, playing Nov. 21-23 and Dec. 4-7 at Oakland University's Studio Theatre. Chekhov saw as comic the chain of unrequited love as Semyon loves Masha, who loves Kostya, who loves Nina, who loves Boris, who loves Irina, who loves no one better than herself. Produced in 1898 by Stanislavsky, "The Sea Gull" drew such acclaim that a gull was adopted by the Moscow Arts Theatre as its permanent emblem.

Guest director Gennaro Montanino of New York has more than 100 theater productions to his credit, including award winning films and new plays. He has taught at Yale University and the American Academy of Dramatic Art.

## ART GALLERY RECEIVES \$1,000 GRANT

The Michigan Council for the Arts has made a \$1,000 grant to support an Oakland University exhibition on "The Ancient Art of the Americas."

The exhibit will run February 17 through March 26 in the Meadow Brook Art Gallery.

Kiichi Usui, gallery curator, will select 60 top pieces of pre-Columbian art from four private collections in the Detroit area and from the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation in New York City.

Members of the Oakland University area studies program will collaborate to present films, lectures, music, and dance programs in conjunction with the exhibition.
