UNIVERSITY APPROPRIATION \$13,493,100

An appropriation from the State of Michigan for Oakland University for the 1975-76 fiscal year was passed by the Joint Conference Committee of the House and Senate on August 14, 1975. The amount of the appropriation is \$13,493,100, and is based on 7,731 CYES (calendar year equated students).

Attached to the appropriation is a rider that at the end of the fiscal year, the legislature will audit utility costs at all public universities, and will provide additionally for utility cost increases by way of a supplementary appropriation. Last year's appropriation totaled \$12,706,500 for 1974-75.

The current appropriation made a provision of three percent for non-salary inflationary increases, and provided funds for a 3.1 percent increase in salaries and wages.

HISTORICAL DOCUMENTS AVAILABLE IN LIBRARY

Oakland University invites the public to make free use of its thousands of early American history newspapers, pamphlets and other documents during the Bicentennial year.

The collection should be of interest to history buffs and to those planning any specific Bicentennial programs, explains history professor Charles Akers.

The Kresge Library's extensive collection includes the Early American Imprint Series. This series contains on microcards every book, pamphlet, broadside or other non-serial title published in America from the beginning to 1813. In a few minutes, one can locate and read on a viewer any publication of the Revolutionary period. Also a printer is available to make copies from the series.

The library has complete files of 21 newspapers of the Revolutionary era on microcards. These include all of the Boston newspapers. On microfilm there are complete files of the Virginia Gazette, different papers under the same name that chronicle the Revolution in that colony.

In addition, the Journals of the Continental Congress are on file. The 34 volumes contain the official record of the First and Second Continental Congress.

The library has acquired a small collection of original Revolutionary publications. This collection was augmented by the recent donation of Professor Akers. Included in this gift was the Rev. Jonathan Mayhew's 1750 sermon against unlimited submission and non-resistance to rulers. Widely quoted by historians, Mayhew's sermon has been called the "morning gun of the American Revolution."

PSYCHOLOGY STAFF IN CONVENTION PROGRAM

Several members of the psychology department will be participants in the program of the 83rd Annual Convention of the American Psychological Association, to be held in Chicago, from August 30 through September 3. Presenting papers will be Amos Spector, whose topic is "preservation of Input Order of Information in Short-term Store," and Randal D. Hansen, "Effects of Behavioral Desirability on Actors' and Observers' Attributions."

Lawrence Lilliston will chair a symposium on "Critical Issues in Undergraduate Training in Various Community Settings." Individual papers in the symposium will be presented by Robert Fink, "Manpower and Training Crisis in Crisis Intervention;" Algea Harrison, "An Applied Psychology Program for Undergraduates;" Allen K. Hess, "Putting Students in Prison: Some Issues in Training;" David Shantz, "Students and Foster Grandparents in a Group Home for Retarded Adolescents;" and Harold Zepelin, "Training in Applied Gerontology: Combination of Theory and Practice."
