Bozardt spent eight weeks working at Tribhuvan University in Katmandu. The summer was devoted to curriculum development and evaluation. Specifically, she worked for five weeks with professors of botany, zoology, and science education to develop courses for the Institute of Science and Mathematics and for the Institute of Education.

During the last three weeks, the Teach Corps Team and approximately twenty Nepali professors and administrators developed a framework for evaluating the total university curriculum. This evaluation is to be conducted by all institutes and campuses of Tribhuvan University throughout the entire country during the next few years.

# WILLIAM WHITE PUBLISHES EXTENSIVELY

William White, speech communication, served as one of the contributing editors of the Annual Bibliography of English Language and Literature for 1972 (Vol. 47), just published in England by the Modern Humanities Research Association, containing 13,044 entries. He also wrote "The Barber in Peoria": Nathanael West Views Hollywood" for The Detroit News, July 17; "How to Sell Samuel Pepys," Literary Sketches, May; "American Studies at Wayne State University,' The Examiner: A Forum of Ideas, Fall-Winter; and reviewed Sanford J. Smoller's Adrift Among Geniuses: Robert McAlmon, Writer and Publisher of the Twenties for Choice, June. also reviewed Martha Mulroy Curry's The "Writer's Book" by Sherwood Anderson for Library Journal, June 15; two books for the March-April American Book Collector, The New Cambridge Bibliography of English Literature and John R. Robert's John Donne: An Annotated Bibliography of Modern Criticism 1912-1967; and Oliver Jensen's Stories of Great Crimes & Trials for Journalism Quarterly, Summer.

In addition, Professor White covered auto races at the Michigan International Speedway this summer for The Pontiac-Waterford Times and wrote several book reviews for The Oakland Press. He also spent three weeks in Mexico City doing, among other things, research on Ernest Hemingway (transla-

tions and editions) at the university there.
