GRANTS BOARD ACCEPTS GIFTS AND OII

The Oakland University Board of Trustees accepted \$231,670 in gifts and grants at the Wednesday, October 22

meeting on campus.

In other actions, the board approved a \$35 special fee to cover costs of an education internship course. The board also established regulations that must be met before the university would act as a fee collection agent for any recognized student organization.

Two major grants were received recently from the National Institutes of Health. One of \$46,047 went to John R. Reddan, biology, for "Control of Cell Division in the Ocular Lens," and one of \$33,625 went to Arun K. Roy, biology, for research on "Hormonal Control of Alpha-2U Globulin Synthesis in Liver."

The U.S. Office of Education made a grant of \$100,754 to support the School of Education's teacher corps training program, and \$15,000 was received from Oakland County to hire an employee under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act. The Oakland County grant runs through June

30, 1976.
