

Third-year OUWB School of Medicine student Maayan Yakir and Embark research and scholarship program mentor Dr. Mary Smyth recently presented their work on energy insecurity affecting young children in the state to the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC).



As a result of their compelling research and advocacy, Maayan, Dr. Smyth and the Medical Legal Partnership at Beaumont Health were invited to join the Commission's Health, Safety and Walkaway Issues Subcommission in the Low Income Workgroup. Now, in partnership with the MPSC and a host of other public, private and non-profit organizations in Michigan, the team is working to ensure that vulnerable populations have access to both housing and utility assistance.

I applaud this impressive and important work and am heartened that it has such great potential to positively impact many, many people.

EXAMINING EXCELLENCE

The Imam Abdulrhaman Bin Faisal University College of Nursing in Dammam, Saudi Arabia, has asked Dr. Kelly Berishaj, director of the Forensic Nursing program in our School of Nursing, to serve on a committee responsible for the development of its own forensic nursing program.
