#### **Pioneer Profile**

#### **David Bricker**

When asked to provide information for a profile, Professor Emeritus David Bricker politely declined, saying, "That would be terribly boring." But when pressured to talk about his extra-curricular activities before and after retirement, he lit up with pleasure. "Now that," he said, "might be a bit more interesting."

David and his wife, Carol, began planning and building a second home on the Lake Huron Shore in preparation for his retirement from OU's Department of Philosophy. It was finished in 2000, complete with an office where David could continue the research on political philosophy and the law that he had started late in his career. That was the plan. But after his retirement in 2001, following two hip replacements and some serious consideration, he asked himself, "Who wants to read more papers on political philosophy? And do I want to spend the time I have left writing them?" The answer, it seems, was, "No."

Fortunately, about the time of that epiphany, someone offered him *Sophi*e, an uncompleted model of a radio-controlled tugboat, in hopes that he would



finish it. By the time it was done, he was hooked.

"I began crafting the ships in 2003," says
David, "and so far I have completed 12 or 13
models altogether, ranging from three-masted
sailing ships to single-masted ships to Chris
Craft runabouts to tugs. They remain on
display at the house on Lake Huron, where we

A sample kit. David's models are all wood, not snap-together, but built from kits like this, ordered from Italy or Spain. Each vessel requires about 8 months' work, spread over two years.

It would take a much longer article to discuss all the ships the Bricker's have on display on the walls of their home. There is a story behind each one, including the model of the Lightening sail boat that they used to sail with their boys, Jeff and John, on Lake Huron. And therein lays the dilemma behind this profile, and the reason David agreed to this interview.

"We are seriously considering the need to downsize and sell one of the houses," says Dave. "And to tell the truth, I am perplexed about the disposal of these models, which mean far more to me than any of my publications. I welcome suggestions as to any persons or institutions that would be willing to display them in the proper way.
