EDITORIAL

MAKING PEOPLE MORAL BY LAW

The Fitzgerald House Council has once again decided to delve into the realm of political issues. By a unanimous vote, the House Council voted to draft a letter in support of the proposed open housing bill now before the state legislature. The House Council action and the enactment of such legislation is opposed by this newspaper.

Open Housing, unlike the banning of recruiters from campus, has no direct effect on the residents of Fitz. It is an issue of purely political nature and should not be acted upon by the elected council of this dormitory. We would have no objection to the members of the House Council signing a letter of support as individuals. But the use of their elected position to comment on a purely political action is worthy of censure.

On the subject of open housing Fitz Bitz firmly feels that every American should be allowed to live freely in any area of his choice. We believe that only through an understanding achieved through living and working together can harmony be accomplished. However Fitz Bitz doubts both the desirability and legality of shch a law.

Since federal, state, or local tax money is not involved and a private dwelling is not a public place, we question the right of the government to interfere in any manor in the sale or rental of private property.

We also believe that among the civil rights all Americans should enjoy is the right to personal prejudice; the right to like or sell your private property to Protestants, Catholics, Jews, Negroes, Communists, Nazis, or man with red hair. The right to reveal your ignorance and bigotry.

EDITORIAL

It has come to the attention of this newspaper that our House Council is at least unofficially pursueing a policy of decimating the house treasury by the end of the semester. The unofficial goal is apparently to leave the treasury with five dollars at the end of the semester. Word has it that one idea being given more than passing consideration is using house funds to take the House Council out to dinner.

Going into this semester, by careful expenditures, a large surplus was built up. Fitzgerald was probably the most financially solvent dorm on campus. The current administration has with its policy of free spending Example significantly reduced the surplus. Many of the expenditures have been worth while. Others have been of dubious value. However the idea of spending the money just to see it spent is pure fiscal irresponsibility. Unlike the gov't our appropriation will not increase because all the money has been expended nor will it decrease if it has not.

It is time the current administration cut back on its spending program. A dinner for the House council is certainly a wasteful expenditure and should not be considered. Moves should be made to save money whereever possible not spend it. Frills and fancies should be cut out. When funds are needed for a major project nothing will be available. It is long past time to eliminate fiscal irresponsibility from House Council policy.

CITY by William F. Buck A MACABRE WEEKEND IN B It was a fun weekend in New York City. One 22 yr. old student, strolling along the West side, was accosted by three Negro youths, did he have a ci rette? Sorry, he didn't: so they stabbed him to death. A 78 yr old man was beasen up in his apartment on the East side, just in case anyone believes that crime in Fun City is asymmetrical. And in the Bronz a husband was tied down while a visitor sodomized his wife, then burglarized the apartment, and left, whistling no doubt. The husband, his bonds untied, rushed out with a shotgun and bagged the assailant, subsequently discovered by police who followed the trail of blood. A cabdriver, age 22, was killed by three young men. And then a plainclothesman spotted early in the morning a 60 yr-old man, running hard after an Amazonian lady, wearing only his shorts. She had broken into his apartment, all 175 lbs of her, rifled his wallet of \$8, threatened him with a knife, and he was now running after her. The policeman took charge, arrested the lady, and then ascorted the gentleman home. On reaching his apartment building, some loitering young men made cracks about his semi-mudity, and the plainclothesman explained who he was, and why the gentleman was wearing only shorts. The youths fell upon the policeman and beat him up. But they did not kill him. The quality of mercy is not absent from Fun City, indeed there are those who maintain it is more fun to maim than to kill.

Not everyone takes that position - New York is very diverse, one of its charms. I have a friend who has always kept his seven year old automobile in a garage just west of 9th avenue, in midtown Manhattan. 'e will not return his car to the garage nowadays because to do so means he is exposed to a ½ block walk on 9th avenue where he must stand and hail a taxi. It is necessary for non New Yorkers to understand that it isn't safe to walk a halfblock in search of a taxi on the west side of N.Y.C. My friend who is unprepared to die, has heard a most bizarre report which might have been the inventive work of Robert Louis Stevenson or Conan Doyle, only in this case its provenance is the police. It appears that there is an extremely exclusive club of young Negroes in N.Y.C. whose membership is limited to those who have killed a white man. The signiture of the club killing is said to be the preliminary

question: "Do you have a cigarette?"

And the rules are that if the passerby is carrying cigarettes and makes them available, he is spared, If the passerby happens to be a non smoker:—well you can't win them all. The FBI turns the whole thing into statistics. In the first 6 months of this year, compared to the same period during 1966, murder is up 26%, rape 14%, robbery 92%, aggravated assault 32%, burglary 49%, larceny 15%, auto theft, 23%. And all this to use the figure of a local commentator: "despite a police force outnumbering a WW II army division".

The weekend news also brings a rundown of the prosecutions that followed the rioting last summer. Here and there the prosecution has been vigorous, e.g. in Atlanta, Cambridge, and Toledo. In Detroit during the riots, 7,231 persons were arrested. Of that number exactly 40 adults are now in jail, and most of them on account of previous crimes. A thousand or so will be tried sometime next spring, around maypole time perhaps.

In Boston after three days of rioting in the Roxbury district, 35 persons were arrested. The total result: five persons fined \$500 each, and three three-month jail sentences. Really, it is riskier by far to walk a dozen blocks in New york minding your own business, than to participate in a riot, burning

stealing and killing.

And finally from Atlanta, we have a report discussing the plans of the Reverend Martin Luther King to organize coast-to-coast civil disobedience, this spy g and summer, which King describes as "a meathod of dislocating the functioning of a city without destroying life and property". For instance, there will be "camp-ins" at the Capitol. Permanent camp-ins. "We intend to go there and stay" said King. I am convinced that King belongs behind bars, along with

get tough. The answer is of course that crime is not cured by punishment, but that crime is curbe by the sequestration of crimals, who ought to be strolling the corridors of Sing Sing rather than the sidewalks of New York. The other point is that neither is crime cured by asserting the apostolic right of Martin Luther King to decide which laws are congenial to him, and which it is the duty of all of us to disobey. Surely there are others who see the nexus.
