

# DAAS students perform at Lions game

Students in the Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences (DAAS) Show Choir are taking Detroit by storm.

The 40-member show choir, made up of fourth- through eight-graders, started its journey a year ago when the students were asked in a homework assignment to create a video of their version of the song *Empire State of Mind*. As part of the class assignment, students rewrote the lyrics to show pride in academic achievement and their hometown of Detroit.

The video, broadcast on YouTube, quickly gained attention, receiving more than 50,000 hits. As recognition grew, the group was invited to perform at the Detroit Goodfellows breakfast meeting honoring musician Kid Rock as Goodfellow of the Year. The choir also performed during a Detroit Lions halftime show, which was featured on Monday Night Football.

Maurice Morton, CEO of DAAS, said the experience fits in well with teaching concepts at DAAS. "Our school's mission is primarily academic, but we utilize the students' other interests to make education fun, connective and to help the students build confidence."

Morton also said the students' experience has been life-changing. "Living in Detroit can have challenges, especially to a young person's self-confidence, so this has been unbelievable for their morale. They learned that through hard work your dreams are possible and you don't have to limit yourself. ... This has shown our students that hard work equals results."



#### **Detroit Edison Public School Academy** health clinic boasts successes

Last year, Detroit Edison Public School Academy partnered with Henry Ford Health Systems to open a unique health center at the school — a clinic that is already meeting with great success.

The Webber Pioneer Health Center is designed to help reduce pediatric emergency visits and hospitalizations. It also provides programs that support working parents and help keep children in school.

"The primary focus is to provide educational programs that help students live a healthier life. The idea is that a healthier student is a more academically successful student," said Ralph Bland, superintendent of the school. To that end, the health center's main goal is to reduce chronic conditions like

asthma, Type 2 diabetes and obesity. These types of conditions can lead to illnesses that make students miss class and greatly affect their health.

Maureen Murphy, RN, BSN, school nurse coordinator, said they have already experienced important successes.

"We have a medically underserved population. One of our sixth-graders needed to have her immunizations

updated, and she was having difficulty making an appointment [outside the school] because either a physician wasn't available or there was another conflict," Murphy

to the school clinic to get her checkup. We discovered she had a 529 blood sugar level — a near-death level — of undiagnosed diabetes. We are so fortunate to have discovered this. It could have gone unchecked for some time and had detrimental consequences."

Murphy further explains that the clinic is part of the school's comprehensive program of health education, including nutrition, vision and dental care. "When the school focuses on prevention first and keeps it at the forefront, it helps reduce emergency visits for the families and keeps conditions such as strep throat or pink eye in check.

"Prior to this, we would have to send the child to an outside caregiver, and the proper care might not happen because of outside challenges," she explained. "At the clinic, we can treat them right away and discuss the conditions in a more in-depth manner."

The clinic is funded through a Michigan Department of Community Health and a Michigan Department of Education grant.

#### **CampRN**

#### Preparing students for careers in nursing

For two weeks last summer, seventh- through ninth-grade students enjoyed a unique camp hosted by Oakland University School of Nursing (SON) and the OU Office of Public School Academies (OU/PSA). Students visited locations including Oakland University's Riverview Institute and Grosse Pointe Beaumont Hospital. The camp is specifically designed for students who show interest in nursing and its related fields.

Funding from OU/PSA allowed students to attend for a minimal registration fee, with scholarships available to those in need. Students receiving a full scholarship attended CampRN with no financial obligations.

Kristina White-Aaron, academic adviser at SON, was very excited about this opportunity for students. "It's an amazing

program. Public School Academies funded the entire camp cost, \$10,000, to run. They provided all the supplies, T-shirts, food, field trip and transportation to and from."

CampRN is a pre-college program that educates students in nursing, biology and chemistry. Students gain experience in pharmacology, nursing forensics, clinical calculations, nutrition, health and wellness. Upon completion of the camp, students are both First Aid and CPR certified. Students also had the opportunity to tour and follow medical practitioners at Grosse Pointe Beaumont Hospital.

"I was able to attend the final presentations. It was great to see both male and female students who had learned so much about nursing and other medical careers. Many students were already asking about CampRN for next summer," explains Majela Morris, administrative assistant, OU/PSA.



#### Model of efficiency

OU is one of six colleges and universities nationwide recognized by *University Business* magazine's Models of Efficiency program. The Models of Efficiency program recognizes innovative approaches for streamlining higher education operations through technology or business process improvements.

#### The Oakland University William Beaumont School of Medicine

Michigan's first new M.D.-granting (allopathic) medical school in 47 years, welcomed its inaugural class of 50 students on Aug. 8, 2011. The OUWBSOM curriculum combines basic science instruction with clinical training, with a focus on team-based, participatory learning in small groups. The school's curriculum also highlights promotion and maintenance of health, not just diagnosis and treatment of disease.

#### Macomb 2 Oakland / Anton Frankel Center

OU's community college partnership with Macomb Community College, M2O, was launched in 2006 to help ease the burden of rising college costs. As part of this program, OU proudly celebrated the grand opening of the Anton/Frankel Center on Aug. 30, 2011. With 11 classrooms, two conference rooms, state-of-the-art classroom technology and free Wi-Fi throughout, students now have access to a quality OU education close to where they live and work.

#### Oakland 2 Oakland

Launched in 2010, the O2O community college partnership between Oakland University and Oakland Community College is one of the first of its kind in the state of Michigan. With a single admissions application, students can take advantage of the resources and course selection at Oakland University in Rochester and five OCC locations throughout Oakland County.
