# YEAR END REPORT:

# Galileo Institute for Teacher Leadership at Oakland University

The 2009-10 academic year saw the Galileo Institute continue to fulfill its potential as an influential voice for developing and supporting teacher leadership. Fulfilling this mission is particularly important at a time when educational policy and politics are undergoing profound changes while the financial support needed to help navigate these turbulent times is rapidly shrinking. During the past 12 months we have sought to provide encouragement needed for school leaders to see teacher leadership as essential at a time when formal instructional support roles have been eliminated. Many have responded to our rallying cry that this is a time for school leaders to "step up" not "hunker down".

We are proud of the Institute's contributions to teaching, service and scholarship. This year's projects included:

- Completion of studies on the roles of superintendent's and principals supporting teacher leadership and a successful collaborative leadership project in a local school district
- Presentation at the conferences sponsored by The Michigan Association of School Administrators, The National Council for Professors of Educational Administration, and the Oakland County chapter of the Michigan Elementary and Middle School Principal's Association.
- Development of a partnership with the Oakland University Early Childhood Department leading to a multi-session series on teacher leadership for early childhood educators
- Participation in the Learning Achievement Coalition-Oakland's on-going work to identify and close achievement disparities in K-12 schools.
- Continued support for the teacher leadership projects in the Van Dyke and Center Line school districts.
- Provided on-going graduate education through the Teacher Leadership Masters and Galileo Education Specialist programs
- Prepared two U.S. Department of Education grant proposals to develop teacher leadership in the Pontiac Schools. The first was rejected and the second is pending.
- Maintained outreach to the education community through an interactive Ning site, monthly newsletters, and weekly podcasts.

The work of the Institute would not be possible without the encouragement and wisdom of the Advisory Board. This remarkable group of individuals has effectively served as a sounding board and source of new ideas. Recently they helped formulate a system change project that will be conducted during the upcoming school year. It is anticipated that 6-10 districts will participate in this project, which will help them maximize the potential of teacher leadership, remove barriers, and learn from successful efforts in other districts.

Other projects for 2010-11 include outreach of more school districts, continuation of the early childhood and achievement gap projects, more frequent Meadow Brook seminars, and possible publication of the first edited book by the Galileo Institute.
