Washington, DC's Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) conferred three Walter O. Mason Awards at its September 14, 2018, Annual Awards Luncheon. Oakland University's, Geri Graham, was one of the three outstanding educational opportunity professionals honored for generating individual and community change throughout their careers. With her nomination agreed upon unanimously, Geri is one of only two Michigan TRIO professionals to have received the award in its 30-year history.

Geri is Director, Project Upward Bound (PUB) College Prep Academy at Oakland University. Under her leadership, in 2016 PUB celebrated 50 consecutive years of service to its

target community. She has been PUB director since 1995; is a past president of the Michigan College Access Programs and Personnel (MI-CAPP) where she continues to serve on the board; is a board director with the Pontiac Academy for Excellence; and has been a long time active advocate on behalf of TRIO-eligible populations.

Geri's Nominator, COE Board President Kaye Monk-Morgan, specifically recognized Geri's successful grass

roots campaign that preserved Prior Experience Points in the 1998 Higher Education Act Reauthorization negotiations. She encouraged the crowd of 2,000 TRIO professionals to emulate Geri's strategy of keeping her TRIO program and professionals connected to the target communities so that support can be rallied on occa-



sions when immediate advocacy action is required on behalf of TRIO-eligible populations.




UPWARD BOUND GLASS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP MAKES A DIFFERENCE

In November 1989, **Project Upward Bound** received the devastating news that its beloved **Director, Mrs. Elizabeth Copeland Glass**, had fallen ill at the annual regional professional conference in Wisconsin. **She passed away in early 1990**. Upon hearing this news, Dr. Manuel H. Pierson had the foresight to ask permission from the family to establish a legacy that would honor Mrs. Glass' memory in perpetuity. So when colleagues, friends, and family asked the question "Is there anything I can do?" the response was "Yes, you can contribute to the endowment fund we are establishing at Oakland University in her name."

That is how **Oakland University's Upward Bound Glass Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund** came into being; and it has been the gift that keeps on giving. Once the minimum principal was secured, the interest, along with funds contributed through PUB's Annual Scholarship Gospelfest, have **generated nearly \$58,000** in scholarship awards over the past 23 years **for 63 PUB alumni** who **enrolled at Oakland University**. Of those, we are able to confirm that **at least 46% either earned a bachelor's degree or are still persisting**; and another 1.6% started at OU then completed a certificate program elsewhere. This success rate **far exceeds the 16% national postsecondary graduation rate** for low-income students (*NCES 11.7.17*).





service activity. We are starting with writing **letters to soldiers** this year. The second and fourth weeks are Math and Science games and activities. The third week is ELA/Social Studies.




College Club wrapped up the **Time Management series** at the end of October and is moving into a new study skills series, "How to Take, and Use, **Good**
