A gruff, whate-haired man of 71, McMamara had won wide respect as a champion of the underdogs-the poor, the tild, the young, and the unemployed. Governor George (Never-on-Sunday) Romney, who would have us believe that he is above (ugh!) politics, delayed his appointment of a successor to the late Senator Patrick Mc-Namara so that Representative Robert Griffin could get an official trip to Viet Nam at taxpayers' expense.
