
I think Winston Churchill eloquently stressed the importance of this when he said, "We make a living by what we get – but we make a life by what we give."

Over that time, he steadily expanded his role and contributions, and now oversees the agency's more than 50 community focused programs.

The organization's work has included

development, construction and rehabilitation of hundreds of affordable housing units, restoration of historic buildings, and development of commercial space for small businesses and community service organizations. Over the last decade alone, Van Camp has helped create permanent housing for more than 1,700 people.

Both Van Camp and Southwest Solutions have garnered national attention and recognition for their successful work. On behalf of an Oakland University community that is proud to call him one of our own, I commend and congratulate this outstanding humanitarian and University ambassador.
