PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT TO PRESENT SERIES OF TALKS AND FILMS

The psychology department will initiate a new series of colloquia next week with a talk by Donald F. Caldwell, director of the Division of Psychobiology at Lafayette Clinic in Detroit, at 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, September 15, in 235 Hannah Hall. He will discuss "Effects of Marijuana on Behavior," a report on recent research conducted under his direction at the Detroit clinic.

Caldwell, who is also a research associate in the section of behavioral sciences in Wayne State's department of psychiatry and adjunct professor of education in the W.S.U. College of Education, received his Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University in clinical psychology. He has engaged principally in research activities and has published in several research areas, notably sleep deprivation in schizophrenics and the relationship between nutrition and behavior.

The new colloquium series, open to all, will present speakers every other Tuesday and films on alternate weeks. It is particularly directed at students who want to hear about psychology in action outside of academic settings. Further information may be obtained from Jean S. Braun (psychology), ext. 2944.

Ticket prices are \$2 for general admission, \$1.50 for faculty and staff, and \$1 for students.
