WOODARD NAMED VP FOR SUNY AT BINGHAMTON

Dudley B. Woodard, Jr., dean for Student Life at Oakland University, is resigning that position to become vice president for Student Services at the State University of New York (SUNY) campus at Binghamton, N. Y.

Woodard hopes to begin his new duties by early September. He will be responsible for the administration of a wide range of student services including admissions, placement, financial aid, advising and orientation, student organizations, residence halls, student center, and the offices of registrar and psychological services.

The 33-year-old Woodard came to Oakland University in August, 1969, as dean of freshmen and associate dean for Resource Services. He held that position until July of 1971 when he assumed his current duties as dean for Student Life. Woodard has been in the student services area since 1962 starting as a graduate assistant at Ohio University. He held several different positions at Ohio University before coming to OU in 1969.

"We leave with mixed emotions. Oakland University has been good to us and we are fond of it. The decision to leave was not an easy one," Woodard said. "My new position offers professional advancement and the chance to work with a wider range of programs than was previously possible. It was a combination of opportunities and challenges that I couldn't refuse," he explained.

University officials cited Woodard for his many contributions to the student affairs programs at OU. They expressed regret at his decision, but they also recognized the significant opportunity he has at Binghamton. The search for a new dean is under way.

Woodard is a member of numerous professional associations and the author of professional papers and articles. He holds a B.A. degree in psychology from MacMurray College, the M.A. degree in human relations from Ohio University, and he received his doctorate from that institution majoring in counselor education. Woodard and his wife Karen and two children have been residing in Rochester.

SPECIAL SERVICES CENTER IS REGISTRATION HIGHLIGHT

A new assistance center will be established for Oakland University's fall registration under auspices of the Office of Administrative Affairs.

OU ANNOUNCES NEW BOYS' CLUB SCHOLARSHIP

Oakland University and the Boys' Club of Royal Oak have announced the first winner of a new scholarship to Oakland University.

Bruce Allan Graham, a 1974 graduate of Royal Oak Shrine High School and a member of BCRO since 1970, is the recipient of the first \$600 scholarship which starts this fall. He plans to major in engineering. The purpose of this scholarship is to encourage participants in the BCRO program to consider higher education as a goal following high school. The scholarships are renewable for four years. A maximum of four scholarships can be in effect by 1977.

Graham was chosen by Oakland University from a group of candidates submitted by John Salter, Executive Director of BCRO. Salter expressed his thanks to State Representative Bill S. Huffman, the 66th district resident from Madison Heights, who brought the work of the BCRO to Oakland University's attention.

OU president Donald D. O'Dowd, said the scholarship is designed to recognize the positive contributions to the community by BCRO through its productive work with young people.
