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October 9, 1973 FALL ENROLLMENT REACHES 9,600

Fall term headcount enrollment as of Oct. 4 is 9,600 students compared with 8,169 for fall, 1972, Registrar Lowell Ruggles reports. The totals will change somewhat over the term due to special late registering courses and some drops, Ruggles explained. The full-time equivalent student data will not be available for some time yet, he said.

The fall figures include 1.250 freshmen and 1.024 transfer students and total figures include 7.027 undergraduates and 2,573 graduate students. There are 1,968 persons taking some credit courses in the evening (the figure includes some daytime students also taking evening courses). In fall, 1972, OU had 1,274 freshmen, 926 transfers, and a total of 6.278 undergraduates and 1.891 graduates. There were 582 persons taking at least one course in the evening.

BOARD APPROVES NEW FACULTY

Nine new faculty appointments for 1973-74 have been announced by Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost. The positions were approved by the Board of Trustees Sept. 24.

New members of the School of Education follow: John W. Atlas (assistant professor), B.S., Grambling, M. Ed. and Ph. D., Wayne State University; Eileen P. Blumenthal (visiting instructor), B.A. University of California at Berkeley, M.A., Rutgers, and study for the Ph. D. in progress at the University of Michigan; and Vera Evelyn Muthleb, (visiting assistant professor), B.A., M.A., and Ph. D. degrees from Wayne State University.

New to the Department of Psychology are: Raymond P. Briggs (visiting assistant professor), B.A. Oakland University, and Ph. D. from Cornell University; Helen A. Two faculty have been added to the Department of Biological Sciences. D. degrees from Wayne State University, and Charlotte M. Patterson-Morgan (visiting assistant professor). Professor Morgan received her B.S., M.S. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Michigan.

Alfred Ruscio, who holds a B.A. from Staley College and a certificate from the Neighborhood Playhouse in New York City, has been named visiting associate professor of theatre arts and artistic director of the Academy of Dramatic Art in the School of Performing Arts.

Two administrative professionals have accepted special faculty appointments in the School of Education for 1973-74. They are William Jorns, an adjunct assistant professor, and Geraldine M. Palmer, also named adjunct as-sistant professor. Jorns continues to hold his AP position as administrative assistant to the dean, School of Education, and Palmer her AP position as administrative assistant to Professor Harry Hahn, School of Education.

MEADOW BROOK OPENS WITH Carson McCullers' prize-winning play, "The Member of the Wedding" will open Meadow "THE MEMBER OF THE WEDDING" Brook Theatre's eighth season on Thursday, October 11, at 8:30 p.m.

The play about the poignant loneliness of adolescence, and the bond of affection between the motherless girl, Frankie, and their Black housekeeper, Berenice Sadie Brown. Terence Kilburn, artistic director of Meadow Brook Theatre, will direct the opening production.

The role of Frankie will be played by Mary Wright of San Francisco, who was seen most recently with the Roundabout Theatre in New York as Ophelia in "Hamlet." The featured role of Berenice Sadie Brown, now one of classic scale in the American theatre, will be played by a distinguished Detroit actress and playwright, Burniece Avery. Ten-year-old Johnny Doran, who plays Frankie's cousin, John Henry, makes his Meadow Brook debut direct from the opening of his first film in New York, "The Secret Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiker," in which he plays the leading role opposite Ingrid Bergman.

Performances for opening week are Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 8:30 p.m.; matinee on Saturday at 2 p.m.; and Sunday evening at 6:30 p.m.
