Record enrollment achieved this fall

Oakland University achieved a record enrollment of 11,051 full and part-time students for fall, 1977. The previous high of 10,526 students was set in September, 1975. Enrollment fell only slightly to 10,457 students last fall.

The final statistics show 8,577 undergraduates and 2,474 graduate students currently enrolled. There were 7,902 undergraduates and 2,555 graduate students last fall.

The new students have registered for a total of 114,758 credits, 7,348 credits more than last fall.

Oakland's growth is not accidental, President Donald O'Dowd said. In 1975, the university began a campaign to increase the number of freshmen from outside the tri-county area of Oakland, Wayne and Macomb, to increase the number of residence hall students, and to improve the quality of students and attract them to a full spectrum of university programs.

The university has attracted highly qualified students to all parts of the curriculum, the residence halls are full, and there are 175 outstate freshmen, more than double the number admitted in 1975, O'Dowd said. The university has student contracts for every one of its 1,328 assignable bed spaces, the president said.

OU receives grant to train teachers

The university has received an \$80,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Education to train elementary school personnel as state endorsed teachers of bilingual education.

Eighty bilingual programs will be held this year in school districts throughout the state, predicts Carlos Olivarez, director of OU's bilingual/bicultural education program. There is a growing demand for state endorsed teachers, he said.

Six graduate students and 17 undergraduates are enrolled in the OU program. They must complete 24 hours of special courses to receive state endorsement to teach bilingual education of Spanish and English.

OU, Wayne State University, and Mercy College are the three area institutions with training programs qualifying students for state endorsement.

O'Dowd pledges funds

President Donald O'Dowd has pledged an increment of \$300,000 in non-general fund monies during the next three years to the strengthening of instructional equipment in all academic areas of the university.

O'Dowd noted that expenditures for instructional equipment had been cut back considerably in the past several years because of budget constraints. He said he hoped the infusion of \$300,000 in non-general fund support would restore equipment inventories to a more satisfactory level.

Pierson selected

Manuel Pierson, dean of student services, has been selected the sole representative from this six-state region to serve on a national task force established to enable the U.S. Office of Education to design and implement a multi-million dollar training program for TRIO personnel.

Bilingual Teachers (cont'd)

Public Act 294 provides that school districts must provide bilingual/bicultural education for any 20 students in the district who qualify. The act covers students whose native language is other than English; those who come from a home where a language other than English is spoken; and those whose academic ability is impaired because of English language difficulty.

Bilingual/bicultural education programs were held last year in Birmingham, Berkley, Farmington, Ferndale, Oak Park, Pontiac, Southfield, Utica, and Waterford.

OU Board requests library addition

A state recommendation that Oakland University scale down its request for a multi-million dollar addition to the Kresge Library building would be accepted reluctantly and in the matter of expedience, the OU Board of Trustees indicated October 4.

But the board reaffirmed its decision that the university's original request was justified on the basis of its enrollment projections and needs.

The university had asked for a 147,000 gross square foot addition to the existing Kresge Library at a cost of \$11.1 million. The state has recommended a 123,000 foot addition at a cost of \$9 million.

The architectural firm of Rossetti Associates of Detroit presented a revised library plan at the October 4 meeting, one that would meet the state request. The board indicated that it could accept an addition of that size in the interest of getting the facility, but it will seek a mechanism where it could recoup the lost space if its enrollment projections are correct.

President Donald O'Dowd said the Department of Management and Budget recommendation for a 123,000 gross square foot addition was based on the equivalent of 10,000 full-time students in five years, the proposed date of completion for the new addition. The university predicts that it will have 12,000 full-time students by that period. In fact, it will have nearly 9,000 by the end of 1977-78, O'Dowd said.
