## UYA PROGRAM BEGINS; NEW APPLICANTS ARE SOUGHT

The University Year for ACTION (UYA) Program is in full operation with Oakland University students having assumed their agency duties including work in the Oakland County Juvenile Court, Pontiac School System, Pontiac Opportunities Industrialization Center, and the Senior and Youth Employment Service.

The Urban Affairs Center is currently considering new applications from persons desiring to enroll in the program beginning fall semester, 1973. Inquiries should be directed to UYA staff members at the Urban Affairs Center, 203 Wilson Hall, 377-3210.

As federal appointees, UYA Interns receive federal benefits as well as \$3,000 while maintaining full-time student status and attending classes.

## JOHNSON JOINS ADMISSIONS STAFF

Thomas D. Johnson, 28, former admissions counselor for Wayne State University, has been named assistant director of admissions at Oakland University.

The appointment is effective immediately, according to Jerry Rose, admissions director. Rose said Johnson will deal with all areas of admissions, but that he will have specific responsibilities for work with community college students.

Johnson is a resident of Mt. Clemens and he holds B.A. and M.A. degrees from Marshall University. His undergraduate work was in English and speech, his master's work in guidance and counseling. He is a candidate for a doctorate from Wayne State University.

## ROAD PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION

Approximately one mile of deep strength asphalt road (over eight inches of depth to asphalt surface) is being completed running west from Adams Road into the parking area of Meadow Brook Festival and then connecting near Sunset Terrace with existing gravel roads leading to Meadow Brook Hall.

The festival portion of the road is already open. Grading was done last week on the portion leading toward Meadow Brook Hall and paving is expected to be completed this week. In addition, acceleration and deceleration lanes are being provided on the west side of Adams and a passing lane is being completed on the east side of Adams. The lanes are necessary for OU to conform to Oakland County Road Commission regulations.

The entire project at a cost of approximately \$100,000 is being paid by the state through funds made available by the state legislature to the state's building division. The new entrance off Adams Road is directly opposite Hillendale and it is 200 feet south of the old entrance to the Meadow Brook Festival grounds.

## NEW COMPUTER INSTALLED; TESTING STAGE IS UNDERWAY

The new Burroughs B 5500 computer has been installed and is in limited service while it undergoes testing. Full production is expected by the fall. The unit, designed primarily for academic uses of students and faculty, has a capacity of 30 lines. Installation took the entire month of June.

## SUMMER ENROLLMENT ON PAR WITH LAST YEAR

Preliminary enrollment figures for OU's summer session are on a par with those for the 1972 session at this time period, Billie DeMont, acting dean of the spring and summer sessions, reports. OU has 2,283 students enrolled and delivering 13,746 credit hours. Final figures to include late-starting or repeating courses will be available Aug. 4, Dean DeMont said.
