FIVE OU STUDENTS GET INTERNSHIP JOBS

Five Oakland University students have been selected as student interns at the institution for 1974-75. The unusual program gives undergraduates a look at the administrative side of higher education.

The students were selected by the Office of Student Affairs and will work in various assignments within the office, Patricia Houtz, vice president for Student Affairs, said.

Participants will receive specific staff assignments and attend appropriate faculty and administrative meetings. The students will attend their regular classes and work an average of 20 hours a week, Miss Houtz said.

The new interns are: Carol Swantek, a junior from Farmington who will work in commuter services; Nikki Mooreland, a junior from Flint who will intern in the residence halls program; Grant Battle, a Detroit senior who will work in judicial systems; Kim R. Rust, a Rochester senior working in advising and orientation; and Mary Sellner, a senior from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who is working with the Village Project.

Four students will work during the spring and summer sessions and the fall and winter terms. Miss Mooreland will begin her duties during the summer session.

OU PROFESSOR RECEIVES FULBRIGHT-HAYS AWARD

SCIENCE LIBRARIAN WINS NATIONAL FELLOWSHIP

Eileen E. Hitchingham, Kresge Library science librarian, is one of twenty-five recipients of a prestigious Council on Library Resources fellowship for 1974-75.

The council, through support of the Ford Foundation, provides fellows with funds for travel, supplies and services.

Ms. Hitchingham will investigate the use of terminal access to commercial on-line services for retrospective literature searching by college and university libraries as an adjunct to more traditional reference services. She will identify user institutions; assess costs incurred; and evaluate effectiveness of such systems.

She is conducting her research from May through July while on a career development leave granted by the university.

OU GRADUATE HONORED FOR HEART RESEARCH

Paul T. Elder, an OU graduate from Mt. Clemens, has been selected by the Scholarship and Awards Committee of Wayne State University as the outstanding Michigan Heart Association Research Fellow of the 1973 group.

Elder majored in biology at OU and he is completing his second year at the WSU Medical School. He was honored Thursday, May 2, at the Heart Association's annual meeting in Detroit. Elder received a plaque.

He was selected on the strength of research done last summer under the direction of Moon J. Pak, Department of Biological Sciences. Elder had obtained a Heart Association research fellowship for his research on the "Effect of Emetine on the Electromechanical Property of Heart Muscle."

DEVORE, SHARPLEY SPEAK AT INTERNATIONAL MEETING

Ronald DeVore and Robert Sharpley, mathematics, recently returned from a week-long international conference on "Linear Operators and Approximation" which was held at the German Mathematical Institute in Oberwolfach, Germany.

Leading world experts lectured on topics related to Operator Theory and Approximation Theory. Professor DeVore's lecture was entitled, "The Degree of Monotone Approximation" while Professor Sharpley spoke on "Intermediate Spaces and Interpolation Theory."

EDUCATION FACULTY ON PROGRAM AT ANNUAL MEETING Three elementary education faculty in the School of Education directed laboratories or presented papers at the recent annual meeting of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development held in Anahiem, Calif.

The theme for the 1974 Annual Meeting was "Creating Curricula for Human Futures." As a part of this theme a series of action/training laboratories were held to provide mini courses of instruction for participants. Several Oakland faculty members played a crucial role in this training session. Roderic E. Righter developed and directed the laboratory around the theme, "Practical Ways of Implementing Ecology in the Elementary Classroom and the Community."

As a part of this laboratory, Anita Bozardt delivered a paper titled, "Practical Ways Of Implementing Environmental Education In The Elementary Classroom," and in addition instructed the participants in just how ecology can be offered in various school and classroom settings. Her procedures included multimedia and "hands on" approaches.

In addition, James Hughes delivered a paper titled, "Cross Cultural Dimensions of the Teaching of Ecology: The African Nations." Hughes also involved the participants via small group discussions in a thorough exposition of the problems of ecology in the Nations of Africa.
