OU EXCEEDS GOAL
FOR UNITED WAY DRIVEOakland University's United Way campaign again broke all records for the institution,
Lewis N. Pino, coordinator of the campus drive, said. The university community con-
tributed \$14,560 to the campaign, 12 percent above the goal of \$12,983 set for the

year.

Pino said a tabulation of participation by university areas is being completed and will be announced shortly but that "obviously we received tremendous support in this important drive or we wouldn't have topped our goal by such a large margin." The drive officially concluded Friday, Nov. 8, but a few pledges are still outstanding and the OU total could climb slightly above the already announced figure, Pino said.

Part II, "Methods for Estimating Moments" and Part III, "Shifts and Drifts" will appear in the next two issues.

STEERS HAS ARTICLES Richard M. Steers, economics and management, recently had three articles accepted PUBLISHED; BOOK ACCEPTED for publication in the area of organizational psychology. The first, entitled "The Role of Task-Goal Attributes in Employee Performance," appeared in the August issue of <u>Psychological Bulletin</u>. The second, "Organizational Commitment, Job Satisfaction and Turnover among Psychia-tric Technicians," will appear shortly in the <u>Journal of Applied Psychology</u>, while the third, entitled "Task-Goal Attributes in Achievement and Supervisory Performance," is currently in press with <u>Organizational Behavior</u> and Human Performance.

In addition, Professor Steers has recently completed a book with Lyman W. Porter entitled Motivation and Work Behavior. The book will be published in early 1975 by McGraw-Hill.

Liboff presented "Environmental Radiation Measurements in Southeast Michigan"; and Jeffry V. Mallow spoke on "Laser Radar (LIDAR) Systems as Instructional Tools."

On Oct. 3, Doherty gave a talk on "Laser Light Scattering From Proteins" at Wayne State University.

CHAPEL CONCERT SET FOR NOV. 25 The second early music concert of the Oakland University series "Music at the Chapel" will be held Monday, Nov. 25 at the St. John Fisher Chapel.

The 8 p.m. program is open to the public at no charge. St. John Fisher Chapel is on Walton Blvd. across from Oakland University.

The concert will feature the Baroque flute, an instrument made of wood and having only one key. The flute produces a soft, warm sound and it is better suited to Baroque chamber music than its modern, metal counterpart.

The program includes Telemann's "Quartet in G" for flute, violin and viola da gamba and his "Concerto in e for Flute and Recorder," and Quantz's "Trio in D for Three Flutes." Music of the 16th and 17th centuries for solo and ensemble lutes will also be performed.

SWARTZ SPEAKS AT EDUCATION CONVENTIONS

Ronald Swartz, School of Education, has spoken at two educational conventions this month. Swartz read a paper called "Academic Freedom, Student Rights and Personal Responsibility Schools" at the American Education Studies Association Convention in

New York City. He read a paper called "Authoritarian Problems and the Development of Educational Programs" at the Midwest Philosophy of Education Society Convention in Chicago. Both of these papers dealt with issues related to authority and responsibility in an educational program and Swartz argues that students need to play a greater role in the educational process.
