OU SENATE MEETS FEB. 13 The next meeting of the University Senate will be Thursday, Feb. 13 at 3:15 p.m. in Rooms 128 - 130 of the Oakland Center. Agenda materials will be distributed through the campus mail.

SIGMA XI INSTALLATION WILL BE HELD MARCH 19 The formal installation of an Oakland University chapter of Sigma Xi, honorary scientific research fraternity, will be held Wednesday, March 19 at 4 p.m. in Room 201, Dodge Hall.

The new chapter officers were elected recently. They will take office at a March 19 business meeting that will precede the installation ceremony. The new officers are: Michael Wozny, president; Curtis Chipman, secretary; Donald Young, treasurer; and Esther Goudsmit, program committee chairperson.

Oakland University has held meetings and conducted a visiting lecturer program since 1965 under Sigma Xi club status. Late last fall at the 75th national meeting of Sigma Xi, the university received chapter status. OU is the youngest university in Michigan to receive chapter status, and it is perhaps the youngest university nationally to receive such recognition.

OU will now have the authority to elect individuals to full membership in the society. The principal qualification for full membership in Sigma Xi is publication of the results of an original scientific investigation in a recognized journal.

Additional details of the March 19 chapter installation will be announced as they are completed. The national society will be represented by one of its officers. Sigma Xi chapters at area colleges and universities are expected to send their delegates to the installation ceremony.

OU, PONTIAC COOPERATE
ON BICENTENNIAL PROGRAMS

The City of Pontiac and Oakland University Bicentennial Committees are cooperating to offer a Wednesday, Feb. 12 Pontiac Bicentennial Town Meeting.

The free program will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the First Federal Savings and Loan Association at 761 West Huron. Entitled "Lincoln Memorabilia," the program will feature a lecture by OU Professor Carl Osthaus entitled "Why Lincoln Still Lives," and a display of Lincoln materials provided by the university and Pontiac committee members.

OU Professor Charles Akers will speak at a future meeting on "The Black Experience in the American Revolution." Cooperative programs between the two committees will be announced as the planning is completed.

James Bullock, provost's office, is a member of the Pontiac committee, and Wilma Bledsoe, director of the Urban Affairs Center, is chairperson of the OU committee.

RICE TO APPEAR ON A.M. DETROIT SHOW F. Edward Rice, director of the University-Community Counseling and Psychological Center, will be a guest on the A.M. Detroit: Wholey show on Thursday, Feb. 13. He will be making his second appearance on the WXYZ (channel 7) television program to

REVEL WILL SPEAK ON ANATOMY OF THE CELL Jean-Paul Revel, California Institute of Technology, will speak on "The Anatomy of the Cell" in a Sigma Xi national lecture Thursday, Feb. 13 at 2 p.m. in Room 235; Hannah Hall. The public is invited.

The program is sponsored by Oakland University's Department of Biology and Sigma Xi, the national honorary scientific research fraternity. Revel is a former president of the American Society of Cell Biology and a member of the editorial boards of the <u>Journal of Cell Biology</u> and the <u>Journal of Histochemistry and Cytochemistry</u>. He is a former Helen Hay Whitney Fellow at Harvard and Cornell Universities.

JOHN DEAN SPEAKS TONIGHT AT 8 P.M.

STUDENTS SELECT NEW GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVES

By a vote of 380 to 372, John Lawton defeated John Shacklett in the 1975 University Congress presidential election. A recount was requested by Shacklett, but Lawton's victory stood.

In a referendum issue, the facilities use proposal was supported 610 to 211. The new body of the University Congress includes six Student Rights Party members, six members from the as-yet unnamed party and six independent candidates. Commuter Council victors in order of votes received were Judy Lindquist, Tom Hawn, Caroline James, Dennis Couch, Charles Buckerfield, Rick Patton, Rudy Oches, Robin Canfield, Drew Creamer, Gerald Clinthorne, and Damon Frezza. The council president will be chosen by the body from the elected membership of the council.

AEROSOL'S EFFECTS ON OZONE LAYER DISCUSSED

The current problem of aerosol propellants in the atmosphere will be discussed at a Tuesday, Feb. 18 program entitled, "Depletion of the Ozone Layer: Propellants, Politics and People." The presentation will be held in the South Cafeteria Alcove of

the Oakland Center from 12:15 to 2 p.m.

Donald H. Stedman, chemistry, atmospheric and oceanic sciences expert from the University of Michigan, will present the scientific view of the controversy. Stedman has done extensive research on the topic and is publishing several papers concerning the stratospheric layer.

OU Professor Roger Marz, political science, will discuss the political implications of the issue. A question and answer period with both lecturers will conclude the program.

INFORMATION SYSTEM TO BE PUT ON COMPUTER

An unusual method of filling the communications gap on campus has been proposed by a group of management students.

That method is a computerized information system that is being developed by students in conjunction with Harvey Shapiro, economics and management.

"The goal of the project," said Laura Kowal, one student developing the system for university credit, "is to establish a workable on-line computer system that is capable of storing and retrieving information pertaining to all types of campus programs and events."

Once implemented, a complete printout of programming information for any given day would be readily available from the computer terminals in Dodge and Vandenburg Halls on a time-sharing basis. A terminal may also be installed in the Oakland Center depending on the success of the program. This system will provide up-to-date information immediately.
