#### GUIDELINES SET FOR BUCKLEY AMENDMENT

Oakland University has identified 11 categories of information that it can release under compliance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (Buckley Amendment).

The government has only recently issued regulations

concerning the act that was passed in 1974.

Information that the university considers to be directory or public information is listed below. Students who want part or all of this information withheld have two weeks from this date (November 16) to file individual requests with Cynthia Livingston, university

compliance officer, room 144, Oakland Center.

Directory or public information includes name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, height and weight of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, including admissions information, degrees and awards received, including scholarships, most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student, and other similar information.

The university will repeat publication of the above guidelines in the fall. Individual students will again have two weeks from the date of publication to request that any or all of the directory information be withheld.

#### OU TO IMPLEMENT ENERGY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Oakland University has engaged Honeywell, Inc. to start an energy management system for the university.

The system will give OU the ability to program and start and stop by remote control some 1,000 horse power of motors that power the fans, pumps, and other equipment on campus.

The university has made great reductions in energy use through a quick-fix method begun in 1971, and the energy management system is the next step in that energy

reduction program.

George Karas, university engineer, said, "None of the earlier savings could have been achieved without the cooperation of the OU community. I know we will receive the same kind of cooperation in the next phase of conservation."

William Sharrard, mechanical engineer, explained that the quick-fix method included reduced building temperatures and lighting levels, reduced building hours, and building shut-downs during vacations.

#### RECORD CROWD AT TEST

The November 14 competitive scholarship examination and career day program was the most successful one ever held at the university, Ed Bagale, associate director of admissions and scholarships, said.

Some 800 students registered for the examination, an increase of 300 over last year. More than 200 additional students and their parents participated in the career day seminar and open house. More than 20 percent of the students attending were from out state, Bagale said.

Students were competing for renewable scholarships of from \$100 to \$600 a year. The awards are based on achievement without regard to family income. Representatives for OU's academic units participated in the program.

#### OU SENATE MEETS NOVEMBER 18

The Oakland University Senate will meet November 18 at 3 p.m. in rooms 128-130 of the Oakland Center. The agenda is being distributed separately.

The university has achieved all the energy and monetary savings it can under this procedure, Sharrard said. Since 1971, OU gas consumption has fallen from over

300 million cubic feet to around 190 million cubic feet in 1975. Electricity use fell from 18 1/2 million kilowatt hours in 1971 to 14 1/2 million hours in 1975.

The university's electric bill in 1975 was \$350,000. Without current energy reduction measures, it would have been \$89,200 greater. The 1975 gas bill was just over \$300,000, but it would have been \$184,800 greater if the university had continued to consume gas at the 1971 level, Sharrard said.

The new energy management system involv 3 the installation of relays and electrical controls running from the motors to data gathering panels in the major buildings. These controls will be linked to the Delta 2000 console already installed in the central heating plant.

The controls will allow the university to cut its costly peak demand time (the hour in which the university uses the most electricity forms a base for utility billing purposes), to set starting and stopping times for many pieces of equipment that need not be running at the same times, and to do equipment programming so that other fans and pumps can be operated or turned off

to accommodate needs.

The new energy management system should be installed by the end of December. In addition to further cutting gas and electricity use, it should save another \$60,000 from the combined yearly gas-electric bills, Sharrard said.

#### MAGAZINE CITES OU FOR QUALITY, LOW PRICE

Oakland University has been cited by <u>Changing Times</u> as an example of a quality school with a less than average tuition. <u>Changing Times</u> is the prestigious Kipplinger

magazine.

The October, 1976 article entitled "Good Colleges at Bargain Prices" notes that a college should never be chosen by its price. Just as the most expensive schools aren't necessarily the best, the least expensive ones can not automatically be rated low, the article said.

The <u>Changing Times</u> article helps college-hunting students and parents by listing institutions with below aver-

age costs and above average academic credentials.

The magazine cited institutions whose total costs—
tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, transportation and personal expenses are estimated to be less
than \$4,568 a year, the national average for private fouryear colleges in 1976-77. State supported schools were
included in the list only if they cost less than that
figure even for out-of-state students. OU's estimated
costs were \$3,112 in state, \$4,368 out-of-state.

OU BLOOD DRIVE SUCCESSFUL

Oakland University donors contributed 370 pints of blood during the October 28 drive. The total was only one pint short of last year when OU had the largest single day blood drive in Oakland County.

The drive was coordinated by Brenda Hillock and Millie Hammerle from commuter services. The OU Student Nurses Association coordinated table volunteers to obtain donor's signatures prior to the drive and check temperatures the day of the drive. Commuter Council provided ice cream cones during the drive and donated proceeds of \$20 to the American Red Cross. Saga provided free orange juice to the donors.

Because of the continued success at OU, the Red Cross is recommending that the university hold a two-day drive in the fu-

ture.



Excerpts from the quality yardstick: average scores of entering freshmen on college entrance tests are well above the national averages; admissions policies are selective; and a good percentage of the graduates go on to graduate schools.

The list is not intended to be exclusive. Some colleges may have been overlooked and many more would qualify if the price cutoff were higher, the article said.

Some of the "bargain institutions" include the University of Wisconsin at Madison, Baylor University, Wake Forest University, Auburn University, and St. Oalaf College.

#### PAY DISPUTE RULING SET

Judge Robert Webster has continued a temporary restraining order halting appeal hearings for faculty whose pay was docked during the September strike. Judge Webster has given the OU Board of Trustees until December 1 to determine by board resolution who should hold the appeal hearings and to determine due process procedures for these hearings.

The faculty union claims that the appeals should be heard by the board. The administration was going to hold appeal hearings before heads of the various academic

units.
