Here we are at the end of another PUB Academic Year (AY), able to report some good news as well as some areas that require more attention. 96% of Summer Retention: Academy participants were retained into the AY; 97.5% of AY participants were retained from beginning to end of the AY. Attendance: 92% of AY participants attended Saturday Academies an average of 73% of the time; and participants attended College Club an average of 63% of the time.

Percentages of PUB participants who earned Fall 2010 GPA improvement were: 55% for Oak Park High, 62% for Pontiac High, and 72% for Pontiac Academy for Excellence High. PAE also had the highest College Club attendance (74%!); so this shows that PUB's tutoring has a positive impact on GPA.

PUB's Class of 2011 has been kept engaged in college-going activities: college fairs, visits, and admission applications; FAFSA completion & submission; ACT retakes, scholarship applications, and polishing up portfolios. All seniors (100%) have been accepted to at least 2 post secondary institutions for next fall.

Led by the PUB Parent Association, participants facilitated 4 PUB Make-A-Difference Days: Food Donation Drive; Thanksgiving Basket preparation and deliveries; hat, scarf, and glove donations; and making and delivering colorful lap blankets to nursing home residents for Valentine's Day. Students and parents who participated received Community Service Certificates.

A dozen juniors participated in the Michigan College Access Professionals & Programs Student Leadership Summit February 18-20. PUB delegates placed 1st and 2nd in the talent competition, and Joshua Guy was our Outstanding Student Leader. (See delegate articles inside.)

Participants who met PUB's minimum standard for academic improvement traveled with Oakland University students and staff to Lansing, MI for "OU Day at the Capitol" on March 22. The agenda included tours, lunch, conversations with state legislators, and a chance to see state government in action.

The April 2 **Graduation & Recognition Ceremony** officially acknowledged 22 seniors' transition from high school to college. As we bid farewell to the Class of 2011, we are equally enthused to welcome rising 10th, 11th, and 12th graders to **PUB's 45**th **consecutive Summer Academy!**

My name is Cynasure Ross and I am a compelling example of what TRIO projects have achieved in Michigan. I participated in Project Upward Bound from September 1996 through high school graduation in June 1999. In addition to standard on-campus sessions, I also spent two summers on campus at Oakland University. I feel that Project Upward Bound greatly prepared and exposed me to the many aspects of campus environment. The discipline we were subjected to was an example of the discipline we would need to govern ourselves in the near future. I know that this experience helped to prepare me for the real thing.

Upon graduation from Pontiac Northern H.S., I attended The University of Michigan, National Institute of Technology, Oakland Community College and Wayne State University. During this journey, encountered many administrative, and financial barriers. Administrative roadblocks include dealing with uncooperative personnel, uninspired counseling and slow financial and registration processing. Academic and financial roadblocks include the difficulty of balancing a full-time work schedule to supplement the cost of education with the desire to achieve satisfactory grades. Even so, I am evidence that perseverance can overcome it all. The culmination of these continuing efforts is my graduation in Electrical/Electronic Engineering Technology from Wayne State University.

Project Upward Bound has influenced my family as well through my participation and enthusiasm with sharing my experiences, such as the Japanese that I learned among other things. My two younger brothers' curiosity about college was sparked through my frequent trips to Oakland University; and they have since pursued their college educations at Grand Rapids Community College and Ferris State University. My two younger sisters have both since attended summer programs at Oakland University. The PUB Administrative Team defined 8 **Expected Learning Outcomes** for the 2011 College/Career Day. Pre/post-test results document that the mission was accomplished; **98% of participants scored higher on the post-test!**









LEARNING OUTCOMES

The U. S. Department of Education requires TRiO Programs to include Objectives in funding applications. These **Objectives predict improvements to all or part of the student body from participating in PUB**. Objectives also drive all grant activities and resource uses. The degree to which Objectives are met (i.e., **the degree to which participants achieve**) **determines whether PUB continues to get funded**.

Oakland University's Division of Student Affairs has introduced Learning Outcomes. While similar to objectives, PUB's Learning Outcomes identify specific change(s) that will occur in a participant because of a specific PUB interaction with them. For example, a College/Career Day Expected Learning Outcome was that each participant would understand the definitions of good and bad credit.

Together, **Objectives and Learning Outcomes** are powerful tools that support planning and measuring progress. They **help** the **PUB** Administrative Team **achieve its mission of preparing high school participants for college success**.







OU Day at the Capitol Lansing, MI








Going to meet State Representative Rudy Hobbs was a good experience for me. He welcomed us with opened arms and



Along with hundreds of colleagues, Project Director Geri Graham attended the 27th Annual Seminar on Relations with the U. S. Department of Education (USDOEd) March 9 in Washington, DC. The highlights included lunch with **Program Specialist Rachael Couch**, a Department update by **Office of Student Service Director Linda Byrd Johnson**, and a detailed explanation of the new TRiO regulations by **Workshop Facilitator Julia Tower**.

Starting with the Upward Bound grant cycle that begins in mid-year 2012, the effectiveness of Upward Bound grants will be measured by the degree to which participants:

Ealin B.A.

Improve grade point average annually
Improve standardized test scores annually
Graduate from high school on time



Enroll in college in the fall immediately following high school graduation

Earn a bachelor's degree within 6 years of high school graduation.

PUB participants, the ball is in your court – the power is in your hands. PUB only continues to exist if you continue to improve academically and reach your educational goals. Your commitment will be reflected in your behavior and your academic outcomes.

SPECIAL MESSAGE TO PUB STUDENTS: Every year, PUB must submit an Annual Performance Report to the USDOEd. As long as you demonstrate growth, Congress will know that spending money on you is a wise investment. **So please, do what you are here to do-graduate from high school prepared to succeed in college**. That way, PUB can continue to be around for future secondary students from your community, your high school, and possibly your family.

3 Post Secondary School Options

Students enrolled at Pontiac High School may earn an Associate's Degree while earning their high school diploma. In the **Early College Program** (ECP), PHS students may start enrolling at Rochester College, Oakland Community College, or Baker College in their sophomore year. ECP requires attending high school classes during the day, then going to college classes in the late afternoon and evening, on Saturdays, and every summer. There is no charge to students.

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Alternatively, the **Pontiac Promise Program** is for <u>any graduate</u> from <u>any high school in Pontiac</u> beginning in 2011. It guarantees funding to attend a post secondary school for 2 years – the time it normally takes to earn an Associate's Degree.



Of the two programs, **PUB** is most excited about the Pontiac Promise. Since it begins after high school graduation, Pontiac Promise is less stressful for students. It does not conflict with PUB's College Club and Summer Academy programming, and it allows students the time to participate in other extracurricular activities. This is critically important to students' social and professional skill development that lays the groundwork for their college and career success.

An added advantage to the Pontiac Promise Program is compatibility with Oakland University's CC-to-O (Community College to Oakland University) Program. With CC-to-O, freshman and transfer students may enroll at Oakland University; at Oakland, Macomb, or St. Clair Community Colleges; or at OU and a community college at the same time. They would officially be OU students with access to housing, the Rec Center, and other student privileges. Further, they can earn an Associate's Degree while earning their Bachelor's Degree because credits can transfer back and forth between schools. CC-to-O is for any student who is eligible to enroll at Oakland University.

The availability of these programs means that earning a Bachelor's Degree just got easier for Project participants! PUB will be happy to help participants weigh the pros and cons of each, on an individual basis, and identify the option that is the best fit for their circumstances.

Back to Capitol Hill we went! Catherine Pannell, Renee Blunt and Geri Graham embarked upon Washington D.C. once again in support of TRiO programs at the Council for Opportunity in Education's (COE) Annual Policy Seminar. Many issues were discussed by very important people. The two most notable people were Dr. Arnold Mitchem, President of COE, and Senator Tom Harkin (Democrat) from the state of Iowa, who is the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and related agencies, and the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

As we met on Monday, March 7, 2011, to discuss strategies for Tuesday's Capitol Hill visits, of course the budget was the main topic of discussion. There was a bill called HR1 that was put on the floor of Congress for a vote on



March 4th. It is a bill that will make appropriations for the department of defense and other departments and agencies of the government for the fiscal year of 2011. If this bill passes it will mean a

cut of 24.9 million dollars from TRiO programs. Of course there were a total of 235 Republicans who voted yes for the bill and 186 Democrats along with 3 Republicans who voted no on this bill. As you can see we have the Democrats on our side and we now must persuade more Republicans to vote no on this bill.

The good thing that happened is President Obama has asked that 853.1 million dollars be appropriated for TRiO programs, which is an increase of 8%. We have gotten through to the president. It is now time, as we stated above, to persuade more Republicans to vote **NO** on HR1. We must also do our part and call, email, get on Face Book, Twitter, and write our Congressmen and women and let them know that we need their support for You must let them know TRiO programs. how important this program is to you and the community you live in. As of now, over 50,000 men, women, and students have been denied TRiO services because of lack of funds. If we get the increase in funds these people will be able to receive services. So please do your part to help TRiO continue to be of service to our communities around the country and to our territories. Thank you.
