

MARCH MADNESS MAN





Program and the **School of Engineering** and Computer Science have spent the last year collaborating on an exhibit for the 2017 Detroit Maker Faire. Led by Associate Professor Colleen **Ludwig** in the Studio Art Program and

Professor Khalid Mirza in the SECS' Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering, four students came to the same design table with differing academic perspectives. New media art students **Sana Mirza** and **Tara Forstner** worked with engineering students **Nicholas Gracey** and **Carla Gerst**, however, to merge their creative,



resourceful, inventive and provocative ideas in an impressive way. The result of their work – an interactive, animated and colorfully illuminated robotic sculpture called "Jelly" – won a blue ribbon at this year's Maker Faire.

Exhibit participants activate the jellyfish-like creation by collaboratively experimenting with gel-filled sensor pad controllers. You can see it at work in this video.
