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Alumnus creates meaningful legacy using IRA

Mark C. Bowers, SECS '75, '69, has fond memories of his days as an OU graduate student. He also recalls how difficult it was to get adequate funding for student projects. "In my own graduate research, I became acutely aware of the scarcity of funding and how much of a struggle it took to get anything done," he explained.

Bowers likens the situation to a Star Trek episode in which the character Mr. Spock had to repair his "tricorder," a futuristic device that could record and analyze data. The time-marooned Spock referred to the archaic hand tools available on Earth during the 1920s to what he had to use to repair his highly sophisticated device as "stone knives and bearskins."

Inspired by his own experiences as well as a strong desire to give back to his alma mater, Bowers designed an endowment to help fund what he calls "technically aggressive" research of

graduate students in the School of Engineering and Computer Science. He hopes the endowment will encourage students with an entrepreneurial spirit to pursue higher-end engineering projects. The fund is aptly named The M.C. Bowers Stone Knives and Bearskins Endowment.

Bowers created a legacy that will inspire others for years to come using his Individual Retirement Account (IRA), a gift asset that will reduce taxes on his heirs without compromising his retirement needs. To accomplish his philanthropic vision, Bowers worked closely with the Office of Planned Giving.
