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## EDITORIALS PRAISE VARNER FOR CONTRIBUTIONS TO OU

Editorial response was swift and complimentary last week following Chancellor Varner's announcement that he was resigning to accept the chancellorship of the University of Nebraska, effective February 1. The Pontiac Press expressed "deep regret . . . over the loss of one of the country's outstanding educators." The Detroit Free Press commented with unaccustomed understatement "Oakland University won't be quite the same without Durward B. Varner running the school." And the Detroit News, reporting the comment of ISU Acting President Walter Adams that Varner's departure would be a "painful loss to higher education in dichigan," editorialized that now was the time for OU to be given its independence from MSU. "Its own board should pick a new president -- not chancellor--and get on with new chapters in the university's development," the News said.

At Nebraska, Varner will be chancellor over a three-campus system with a total enrollment of 32,000. Each campus has its own president and administration. Provost Donald D. O'Dowd, who assumed the additional title of Vice Chancellor last fall, is expected to be named acting chancellor by the MSU Board of Trustees at their January meeting.

# LET'S HEAR A 'RAH RAH' FOR THE SCHOOL COLORS

Gene Boldon (sports and recreation) can sympathize with state officials who are agonizing over the lack of contrast in gold and white Michigan license plates for 1970. The OU school colors were adopted for plates in observance of Oakland's Tenth Anniversary Year, and police officials charge they cannot be read on moving vehicles. A similar problem with the school colors is bringing about a change in basketball team uniforms.

Boldon said the gold letters of the new "home" white uniforms will be framed in black for easier identification from the sidelines. When "away" uniforms are bought later, Boldon said, they will be changed from the present gold color to black. That will prevent a re-occurrence of a recent tournament mixup when Oakland's players wore gold as the dark-uniform contestant and the opposing players, whose school colors were blue and gold, wore gold as the light-uniform contestant.

Ted A. Panaretos, Director of Community Relations at Pontiac State Hospital, has sent a letter of thanks to the OU staff for their donation of new clothing to the hospital patients. He feels that the patients will be much happier this Christmas because they have not been forgotten.

### UNIVERSITIES NEGLECT THE AGED. EKLUND CONTENDS

Dean Lowell Eklund (continuing education) urges campuses to operate as "perpetual universities for lifelong students" in a chapter of a book, Aging and Society: Implications for the Professions, just published by the Russell Sage Foundation, New York. Eklund's treatise on "Aging and the Field of Education" accuses higher education of ignoring the aged in its current emphasis on fixed units of education and terminal degrees. Instead, he contends, all educational programs—from kindergarten through those for the aged—should stress "learning how to learn" and problem-solving skills.

"Institutions of higher learning should be viewed . . . as perpetual universities that assume a responsibility, not just for four years, but for forty-four or more years of educational pursuit by their lifelong students," the dean writes. "Older adults must be served through education . . . they deserve it; society needs it . . . (their) ever increasing numbers and days represent a growing resource whose potential is too precious to neglect; and, conversely, whose neglect is too great a social and economic loss to countenance."

#### JOHN HOPE FRANKLIN LECTURES AT OU

Noted historian John Hope Franklin will lecture and visit with students and faculty Jan. 12-13. He is OU's 1969-70 Sidney Hillman Lecturer. Franklin will hold an open discussion with students at 7 p.m., Jan. 12, in the lounge of Vandenberg Hall. His principal address will be at 2 p.m., Jan. 13, in the new multi-purpose room of the Oakland Center with a discussion period to follow. Franklin is the chairman of the department of history at the University of Chicago and he is widely known and respected as a scholar, teacher and author. His many books include From Slavery to Freedom: A History of Negro Americans, and The Civil War Diary of James T. Ayers.
