

Wilder to fold tent, steal Off into night Wilder: Arab advisor.

David Wilder, Oakland's head librarian, has resigned, effective August 15. He will go to Baghdad, Iraq, on a Ford Foundation Fellowship as consultant to the Rector of the National University of Iraq. The government of Iraq has been studying possible ways of certralizing and making more efficient their library resources; Wilder will become a major figure in these studies. The Ford Foundation has made its grant for 21 months, beginning in September of this year.

Built Library Wilder came to Oakland in 1959, and began building the library from scratch. Oakland now boasts over 40,000 volumes and a valuable microfilm collection. Among the many innovations Wilder insisted upon were: open stacks, with no limit on how long a book may be charged out, and no Pinkerton hoodlum at the door to frisk departing scholars; the Library of Congress catalogue system, instead of the cumbersome Dewey Decimal System, frequently employed by small libraries; tables and chairs sufficiently comfortable to support work for more than fifteen minutes at a time.

Recently under criticism be-cause of alleged short library hours, Wilder has always stood fast in believing that a library must have a reference librarian on tap at all times whenever it is open. His belief, which has prevailed so far, is that a library must maintain something more than the dignity of a study-hall.



"The program for the day will


begin at 7:30 in the morning with registration," Lowy continued. "After that they will meet with their divisional advisors, and will report to testing areas by 9:00."



Hucker on ACLS Panel

Charles O. Hucker, professor and chairman of history and director of the area studies program has been elected to serve with nine other scholars on a national Committee on Chinese Civilization.

The Committee will meet under the aegis of the American Council of Learned Societies, and will work to stimulate and coordinate research on traditional Chinese history and culture.






