Would you please arrange to conduct, according to your School or College procedures, an election to fill the number of Senate seats shown in the "number-elected" column. For your convenience I have attached a current list of organized faculty, as shown by the files of the Office of the Provost. It is from this roster that your senators are to be selected.

Special note for the School of Economics and Management and the School of Human and Educational Services: The Elections Committee determined to allot these units half seats, thereby adhering more closely to the apportionment formula than rounding to the nearest integer would permit. Accordingly, the School of Human and Educational Services could elect five senators, one of whom should be designated to have a one-year term and serve during 1981-82. The School of Economics and Management should elect three senators, one of whom should be designated to serve a one-year term in 1982-83.

Special note to the Center for General and Career Studies: The faculty of the Center (Department of Learning Skills) is for the first time voting as a separate unit rather than as part of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Special note to the Center for Health Sciences and the Institute of Biological Sciences: Senate action of December 6, 1979, combined these two units for Senate representation purposes; a single elected senator shall represent the combined groups. Therefore, it will be necessary for the respective faculties to agree upon an election procedure which will yield such an outcome.

At the conclusion of your elections would each of you please advise me of the names of your new senators. The electoral process should be completed prior to the end of the winter semester.
