## Former Advertising Executive Fills Director of Special Projects Post

A veteran Birmingham advertising executive was named to the newly-created position of Director of Special Projects at OU.

Robert A. Dearth, former Senior Vice-President at the D. P. Brother agency, was announced as director (effective immediately) at the Oct. 18 Board of Trustees meeting.

President O'Dowd said that Dearth will report directly to him. He will work with the OU Foundation and President's Club, two groups of citizens dedicated to the advancement of the University, and will coordinate the many fund raising activities within the University.

President O'Dowd said Dearth will also be responsible for a wide range of special projects in the president's office. He welcomed Dearth as an experienced professional and valuable addition to the University's administration."

Dearth had been with D. P. Brother since 1966. His previous positions include an Executive Vice-Presidency with Kenyon and Eckhart where he worked from 1961-66; service from 1956-61 for Morse-International, Inc., where he held the positions of President and Executive Vice-President; from 1949-56 he was with Ross Roy, Inc., holding the positions of Vice-President and Assistant to the President.

## Billie DeMont Named Dean of Credit Evening Program

Ms. Billie DeMont was named the first Dean of OU's new credit-granting evening program by Frederick Obear, provost and vice-president for Academic Affairs. The appointment (effective immediately) was approved at the Oct. 18 Board of Trustees meeting.

"After a thorough search for the most qualified individual for this challenging position, we agreed that the best candidate was already

on our campus," Obear said. Dr. DeMont was Director of Curriculum Development for OU's Urban Affairs Center.

In addition to serving as Dean of the Evening Program, Dr. DeMont is also Acting Dean of the spring and summer sessions, Obear said.

President O'Dowd noted that, "We are fortunate to have found such an outstanding choice for dean. Dr. DeMont is a widely respected teacher and administrator."

The Dean's immediate duties are to enlarge the University's evening credit programs for this winter term, to investigate the possibility of opening off-campus evening program centers and to plan a major series of course offerings for the 1973-74 year, Obear said.

Commenting on her new duties, Dr. DeMont said, "I think the creation of the evening program affords an exciting opportunity to serve an entirely new clientele in the communities surrounding Oakland University."

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## Michigan Council for the Arts Grant Goes to Aid Meadow Brook Theatre

A group of adult students who have returned to complete their high school educations are being introduced to Meadow Brook Theatre. For many, it will be their first viewing of a live play.

A \$8,700 grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts is being directed by Jane Mosher, director of community relations for Meadow Brook Theatre and Festival.

Funded for one year, the project includes 500 adults attending classes in the Waterford, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Hazel Park school systems.

The first group of students from Hazel Park, mostly ADC mothers, attended Meadow Brook Oct. 17.

"The program includes much more

than attending each theatre performance," Mrs. Mosher said. "There will be study materials given to their teachers and incorporated into English, humanities, speech and literature courses. We are offering tours of the backstage theatre--making costumes, setting up lights and seeing dressing rooms and other theatre facilities."

There are seminars for the teachers to acquaint them with this season's plays so that they can teach about them more effectively.

"We are stressing theatre as a communication vehicle and we hope to multiply the base group of 500 through their recommendations. Many bring spouses and friends," Mrs. Mosher explained.

First in the series is Donald Morse, Dept. of English, whose topic is "my last lecture: since feeling is first..." from e.e. cummings. It's scheduled for 4 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 26 in the Gold Room, OC.

Morse has been a host for "The Folk Show," Detroit's oldest folk music program, on WQRS-FM. He has also been secretary of the 18th Congressional District Democratic Party since 1968, and is serving as a McGovern precinct delegate for 1972-74.

Three other lectures are sched-

uled for fall semester: Judy Brown, Dept. of Sociology, will speak Nov. 16; Tom Aston, New College, speaks Nov. 30; and Homer Kennedy, OU student, speaks Dec. 14.

Another series is planned for winter semester.

## Pioneers Avenge Last Year's Win Over Defiance

The Oakland Pioneers avenged last year's worst defeat beating Defiance of Ohio 3-1, in a soccer match played Saturday, Oct. 14. Although the score was close, the Pioneers completely dominated play to gain their first victory of the year.

In the first half OU led in shots-on-goal 17-0 and also in corner kicks 9-1. The first OU goal was scored by John Clark at the 13 minute mark on a rebound of a shot by Armand LeComte. Then at the 34 minute mark LeComte himself put one



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past the Defiance goaltender. Mike Ligilai, from Kenya, had five shots-on-goal in the first half, but got no points.

The second half was played evenly. Oakland had six shots-on-goal, Defiance had five, and both teams had three corner kicks. Defiance closed the gap to 2-1 when Mike Yuritch scored after 40 minutes of play in the half. LeComte got the goal back for OU when he scored on an 18-yarder at the 43 minute mark to make the final score 3-1.



## Board of Trustees Accept Over \$1 Million in Grants

Over \$1 million dollars in gifts and grants was formally accepted by the OU Board of Trustees at their Oct. 18 meeting.

With the total dollar amount at \$1,018,378, the largest block of grants was \$780,402 from the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare. The grant includes \$193,011 for the College Work-Study Program; \$304,151 for the Education Opportunity Grant Program and \$283,240 for the National Direct Student Loan Program.

The National Science Foundation granted \$70,300 to the School of Engineering to support "Mixture-Vapor

Transition Point Oscillations in Two-Phase Flow," under the direction of Gilbert L. Wedekind.

The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission gave \$31,000 for research on "Cellular Regeneration and Proliferation Following Tissue Damage," directed by Clifford V. Harding, Dept. of Biological Sciences.

"Hormonal Control of 2U Globulin Synthesis in Liver" will be supported by a \$21,938 grant from the National Institutes of Health under the direction of Arun K. Roy, Dept. of Biological Sciences.

Among other gifts and grants are: an eight-inch Newtonian-Cassegrain telescope donated by graduate Jerry Persha, Royal Oak, and valued at \$2,500; a \$4,225 grant from the International Research and Exchange Board of New York to cover expenses for an exchange scholar, the project to be directed by Michael Wozny, School of Engineering; a \$2,500 grant from the Bendix Corporation, Southfield, under direction of Engineering School Dean John E. Gibson, an additional award to be used for research in the thermal sciences; \$2,400 from individuals in support of the Friends of the Oakland University Art Gallery; and \$2,134 from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation to support the Kellogg Foundation Continuum Center.

Grants of \$83,447 came from the Matilda R. Wilson Fund, including \$61,904 in support of Meadow Brook Hall conversion, and \$21,543 in support of Meadow Brook maintenance and operations.

A native of Knoxville, Tenn., Dr. DeMont's present residence is Rochester, Mich.
