UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT RISES TO 1811

Oakland began its sixth year with an enrollment increase of 21 percent and a total student count of 1811, according to Herb Stoutenburg, Dean of Student Affairs and Registrar. Of the new students 662 are first-time freshmen and 225 are transfers from other colleges.

This year's total represents an increase of 313 students over last fall's registration of 1498.

Oakland has more than tripled in size since it opened in the fall of 1959 and, according to Stoutenburg, estimates are that it will grow another 25 percent to more than 2200 students next year.

Other registration statistics are that there are 928 men and 883 women students. Geographically the students come from:Oakland County--1082;Macomb--237; Wayne--154; 50 other Michigan counties--235; out-of-state--93 from 18 states; foreign students--10.

The addition of Hill House dormitory has made it possible to accommodate more resident students raising the on-campus dwellers to 492. The new six-story Hill House was completed November 3 although students had been living in its lower two stories since fall term began in early September. Residents of floors three to six moved in October 30 after living nearly two months in tripled rooms in the existing dormitories.

WHO ARE ALUMNI?

Oakland University will include on its alumni rolls all graduates of the University, and any student who successfully completed 32 credit hours prior to withdrawing from the University.

An alumnus' class will be designated by the year of his class' graduation whether the graduation occurs in January, April or August.

In order to assure accurate and up-to-date records, all alumni are urged to keep the Alumni Relations Office advised of changes of address, phone numbers, etc. "Our records can only be as current as the information furnished us," said Mrs. Dorothy Hope, Assistant Director of Alumni Relations.

STUDENTS FETE MRS. WILSON ON 81st BIRTHDAY

Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson helped students toll a bell "borrowed" from Delta Upsilon fraternity at Michigan State University at midnight on her 81st birthday. The bell ringing climaxed a semi-formal birthday party given by the students for the founder.

The bell was liberated from MSU, where it is used to toll football scores, by OU students who posed as students of a high school which had made arrangements to borrow it for their football game. out the evening to insure its availability for the birthday ceremony.

Theme of the evening was the Meadow Brook Festival and a model of the pavilion topped a five foot high birthday cake (70"x 65" wide) which was wheeled into the resident cafeteria in mid-evening for presentation to Mrs. Wilson. The cake was creation of Ed Goodwin while the model atop it was built by Dick Moore, maintenance supervisor. Mrs. Wilson was presented a bouquet of 32 roses: one red for the first 50 years and 31 yellow. A birthday card with a 40 by 60-inch rendition of the pavilion by artist John Marshall (father of OU senior John, Jr.) was presented with the roses.

CROSS COUNTRY IS FIRST INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORT

A schedule of seven cross country meets marks Oakland's entry into intercollegiate sports. Against the 9 teams encountered in the first four meets Oakland's "Pioneers" scored four wins and five losses.

On October 20 Oakland beat Schoolcraft College in its only meet scheduled on home ground. Other opponents to date have been Aquinas and St. Francis (Ind.) at Grand Rapids; Adrian, Albion and Defiance (Ohio) at Adrian; and Windsor, Aquinas, and Schoolcraft at Windsor.

The seven man team coached by Hollie Lepley is made up of six freshmen and one sophomore.Oakland's fastest runner for the 3-mile cross country in the initial four meets was Louis Putnam of Caro.

"Pioneers"will be Oakland's team name for intercollegiate sports.

SEVENTY GRADUATE IN AUGUST

70 students earned bachelors degrees at the close of the spring semester in mid-August. This raised the total number of Oakland graduates to 444.

ALUMNI FUND DRIVE TO START IN 65

An alumni fund drive with a first year goal of \$2000 and 100% participation has been planned by the Alumni Council. "The 'charter' drive will be conducted between February 1 and May 31, 1965 and represents another step in Oakland's coming-of-age as a University," said Council President Jim Morrison '63.

Preliminary organization plans were made at a late September Council meeting when Bill Kath was appointed class agent for '63 and Penny Batts for '64. They are currently recruiting fund drive workers so that each worker will contact 10 classmates.
