







Paul Weinberg's Article Accepted by J-PEER

Dr. Paul Weinberg recently had his article, "Mechanistic Reasoning in Domain-Specific Contexts," accepted by the *Journal of Pre-College Engineering Education Research (J-PEER)*. The article reports on mechanistic reasoning, an epistemic practice central within STEM

disciplines. Although the United States is adjusting to a new emphasis on engineering education for K-12 students, there is not one single definition of or orientation towards what that should involve. While some significant assessment work has been accomplished in engineering education to date, there are still many opportunities for assessments to be developed for pre-college populations as many states have begun adopting the NGSS. In particular, mechanistic reasoning is an area where limited assessment work has been accomplished.



The data in this study comes from the Assessment of Mechanistic Reasoning Project (AMRP) (Weinberg, 2012), designed to diagnose individuals' mechanistic reasoning about systems of levers. Such a characterization of mechanistic reasoning illuminates what is easy and difficult about this form of reasoning, within this subdomain of simple machines. Moreover, this work indicates how domain-general principles may be limited.

The study participants include elementary, middle, and high school students, as well as college undergraduates and adults without higher education. This study provides evidence that mechanistic reasoning is not dependent on age, but rather on experience within specific STEM domains.
