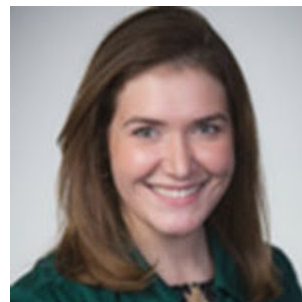

Kristin Rohrbeck Nominated for Oakland County Executive's 2019 Elite 40 Under 40 "Best of the Best"

Kristin Rohrbeck, director of the Joanne and Ted Lindsay Foundation Autism Outreach Services (OUCARES), has been announced as one of three nominees for the "Best of the Best" of the Oakland County Elite 40 Under 40 Class Set for 2019. According to a press release from the Oakland County Department of Economic Development and Community Affairs:



"As director of OUCARES, Kristin serves over 2,300 people impacted by autism spectrum

disorder in southeast Michigan with more than 100 annual programs. The award-winning OUCARES program has been featured more on various TV, radio and other media.

In 2018, she led the development of a partnership with the Ted Lindsay Foundation, which resulted in a \$1 million gift to grow OUCARES programs to support teens and adults living with an autism spectrum disorder. She developed an employment readiness skills program for adults which resulted in more than 30 adults either receiving jobs or continuing their education to reach career goals.”

Evening in the ERL: Spotting the Warning Signs Event – February 6

An Evening in the ERL — Spotting the Warning Signs: Supporting Children Facing Trauma and Stress in Our Classrooms will be held on Wednesday, February 6 from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m.

Statistics about the number of children who have experienced at least one adverse childhood experience (ACE) are alarming. A 2017 fact sheet on [adverse experiences among U.S. children](#), issued by the Childhood and Adolescent Health Measurement Initiative, found that nearly 47% of all children in the United States have experienced ACEs such as abuse, neglect, death of a parent/guardian or witnessing community violence. A panel of OU faculty and staff, along with social workers and educators from Rochester Schools, will present information and a discussion about identifying and responding to the needs of children in K–12 classrooms who are living with stress or have faced traumatic experiences which impact learning and behavior.

All students, faculty and staff are welcome, but registration will cap at 40, so be sure to [register soon](#).
