ACCOLADES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Instructional Design Text Co-Edited by Jim Quinn Reaches Two Major Milestones

The recent release of the 5th edition of [The ID CaseBook: Case Studies in Instructional Design](#) also marks its 20th consecutive year of publication. First published in 1999, The ID CaseBook is the leading textbook for doctoral and advanced master's students in instructional design, and has been a standard text in MA and PhD programs since its initial publication.



Dr. Jim Quinn, who teaches instructional design and applied ethics in the Department of Organizational Leadership, says that the book originally came about when he and Dr. Peggy Ertmer, a colleague from Purdue University, presented cases they had developed for use in their own courses at a national conference in 1996. The level of interest from the audience was so high that they decided to work with practitioners and scholars to develop a case-based text.

"I guess it was being in the right place at the right time, as clearly faculty were aware that case-based teaching could give students multiple experiences of tackling instructional design challenges across a wide variety of complex situations. The book immediately took off," says Jim, "and today, almost a generation of instructional designers has used the text as a core part of their graduate education." However, faculty were also commonly unfamiliar with case-based teaching, and so a substantive instructor's guide, providing extensive teaching suggestions for structuring a case-based course, as well as additional teaching resources for each case (e.g. background information, debriefing guidelines) has always been made available to instructors. "Over the years," says Jim, "the feedback that we have received has

been that the instructor's guide has been pivotal in supporting instructors' initial forays into case-based teaching and learning."

Currently, Jim is working on "Teaching Applied and Professional Ethics: A New Perspective," due to be published in early 2021, and has recently been invited to author a text on the ethics of instructional design. "As instructional design matures as a profession, there's a recognition that instructional design professionals need a solid foundation in ethics, and are able to apply ethical reasoning skills in handling ethical dilemmas that they will inevitably encounter in their careers," says Jim, "so, I guess I'll be busy writing, and very happily so, for the next several years!"

Top Open-Enrollment High Schools in Detroit

Two Oakland University public school academies are among the top ten open enrollment high schools for college enrollment in the city of Detroit. Detroit Edison Public School Academy (DEPSA) has 73% of its 2018 graduates enrolled in college, making it the number one school in the ranking. Universal Academy was ranked 4th with 60% of its graduates enrolled. 
Graduation Reception — April 26
