SEHS Alumnus Receives \$25,000 Milken Educator Award

SEHS alumnus Nick Peruski was recently named the 2019–2020 recipient of the Milken Educator Award. Deemed “the Oscars of Teaching” by *Teacher* magazine, the award is given to elementary and secondary school teachers, principals and specialists across the country for furthering excellence in education. The award includes a \$25,000 cash prize and membership in the National Milken Educator Network, a group of more than 2,800 top teachers, principals and specialists dedicated to strengthening education.



Peruski received an Education Specialist Degree in Educational Leadership from Oakland University earlier this year. He currently teaches business and technology at Lakeland High School in White Lake, Michigan, where he is also the coordinator of the career and technical education (CTE) department. He is the sole Milken Educator Award winner from Michigan this year, and is among up to 40 honorees for 2019–2020. The award was presented to him at a surprise school assembly last Friday, December 6 by Milken Educator Awards Senior Program Director Greg Gallagher and Michigan Superintendent of Public Instruction Dr. Michael F. Rice.


Counseling Students Awarded at AGEP Student Success Conference

Mary Lose Featured in New Article on the Science of Reading

Education Week's series of stories on "reading instruction" and the "reading wars" was featured last week from December 3–5. Dr. Mary Lose, director of the OU Reading Recovery Center and professor of Reading and Language Arts, whose philosophy of reading instruction more closely aligns the "balanced approach" in contrast to the "whole language" or "phonics" only approaches to literacy teaching and learning, was quoted in the story.

Reading Recovery Is an Approved Provider by MDE

As part of the State 2019–2020 School Aid appropriations (PA 58 of 2019 Sec. 35a), the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) was charged with publishing a [Research-Based Effective Literacy Instruction Professional Learning List](#). The list includes research-based effective literacy instructional professional learning to provide schools and school districts with a choice of professional learning that adequately enhances teacher quality and is a major vehicle that schools/districts can utilize to upgrade their capacity as it relates to the implementation of research-based literacy instruction. The proposal Dr. Mary Lose submitted on behalf of the state's Reading Recovery schools and districts was accepted by the MDE.
