

#### STUDENTS EARN CREDITS AT VETERANS' HOSPITAL

Eight Oakland University students will be taking part in a first-of-its-kind program as part of a directed research project for Allport College, an "inner college" of Oakland University. 0.U. has signed an agreement with the Veterans Administration to permit the students to conduct research at the Veterans hospital in Hampton, Va., while living at nearby Hampton Institute. The students have finished courses in behavioral sciences and will be earning off-campus credits for the research. The program will last from May 8 through the end of June.

Allport College focuses on the behavioral sciences and relates these to the technical sciences and the humanities. It is a four-year college, not designed to be a major in itself, but to accompany the student's departmental major. Freshmen in Allport College take general courses in behavioral and preceptorial sciences, which also fulfill University academic requirements. Sophomores are offered a program of guest scholars and the junior year is spent doing a directed research project or other form of off-campus study. Seniors are offered a Colloquium course.

Carl Vann, chairman of Allport College, stresses the use of small classes and tutorial experiences as well as large-group activities. "Salon Seminars" which include cultural demonstrations and experiences with people of other countries and their literature and cultures, are organized by the Allport faculty


# ALLAN NAMED NEW DIRECTOR OF OAKLAND'S COMPUTER SERVICES

He has extensive experience in Basic Assembly language, FORTRAN II and IV, COBOL and MAP, and the GE 400 series operator systems and compiler design.



### BLACK AMERICAN HISTORY ON TELEVISION

Black American History will be the topic on "TV College," WXYZ-TV (Channel 7) during the weeks of May 15-19 and May 22-26. The current series is on "The Black Experience: Its Sources and Substance."

Two historians, De Witt Dykes, Oakland University, and Norman McRae, Detroit Public Schools, will be the main lecturers during these two weeks. Dykes, who is in his third year of teaching history at Oakland University, will give four lectures.

In his first talk, "African Explorers and Servants in the New World," to be shown on Tuesday, May 16, Dykes discusses African exlorers who sailed to the Americas before Columbus and the Africans who were indentured servants in the 1600's. Wednesday, May 17, Dykes discusses "The Atlantic Slave Trade."

Thursday, May 18, Norman McRae will cover "The Peculiar Institution of Slavery" and on Friday, May 19, McRae's topic will be "Cotton as King."

Dykes' topic will be "Black Pioneers" of the American revolutionary period and the founding of błack institutions on Monday. May 22.

### GOLF TEAM PLANS SIX MATCH WEEK

Captain Dave DeWulf, Bloomfield Hills senior, shot 73 on the Bald Mountain Golf Course Saturday to lead the OU Pioneers to a 305-311 victory over the Grand Valley State College team. The win was the fourth dual match victory against two defeats. Scores by other team members were: 77's by Gerard Tarr, Troy, and Jon Brown, Pontiac; 78 by John Hillman, Taylor; and 82 by Kevin Fair, Chicago.

The Pioneers lost two early season matches to Saginaw Valley State College and Grand Valley State College, but have since defeated both teams plus Albion College and Northwood Institute.

Other programs in the series will continue Monday through Friday, until July 7th. All programs will be shown on WXYZ, Channel 7, from 6:30 to 7:00 a.m.

The series is a credit course coordinated by Professor Margaret Ashworth through Wayne State University's Division of Urban Extension.

### COLLEGE INFORMATION DAY AT O.U. DRAWS STATE-WIDE ATTENDANCE

Oakland University will hold its 7th annual College Information Day (CID) Saturday, May 20.

High school juniors from all over Michigan will attend the half-day session. Designed to answer the hundred-and-one questions whose answers are often elusive and fragmented at the high school level, the Information Day is open to all high school students.

Faculty members from the Schools of Economics and Management, Engineering, Education, and College of Arts and Sciences will be available to talk with an expected 500 students about their areas of interest. The Admissions Staff will hold discussion groups on college entrance procedures, factors to be considered in the selection of a college and will give pointers on filling out scholarship forms and applying for financial aid. Irrespective of the school, the CID can help any student to get general information for whichever school he plans to attend.

Thirty to forty per cent of Oakland's freshman class have generally taken part in CID. In addition, students already enrolled for college in the fall may attend and perhaps find solutions to new and unforeseen problems.

The information and opportunities discussed during CID are valuable to both parents and students and can help them avoid a long wait for college entrance and scholarship application replies by giving them an early start.

Participants will meet at 8:30 a.m. in the Wilson Hall Theatre for refreshments and a welcome address. The morning will end with a tour of Oakland's campus.
