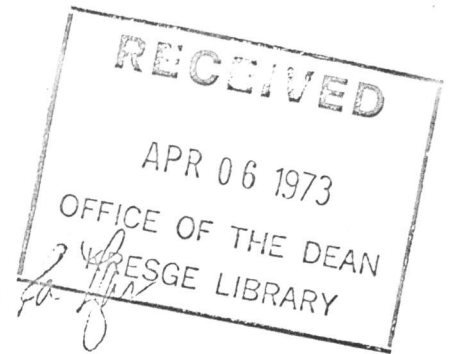


MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: Allocations of Seats for 1973-75 Senate



The Constitution of Oakland restricts any one organized faculty to 49 percent of the total seats in the Senate (according to precedent), not to 49 percent of the elected seats in the Senate as my recent memo was calculated.

There are 39 seats to be elected. Arts and Sciences has 219 of 305 full-time members of organized faculties, which is 71.8 percent of the 39 seats or 28 seats. However, they are limited to 49 percent of the total Senate (presently 55 seats) or a limit of 27 seats.

Performing Arts would not qualify for any elected seats based on their count of full-time members of organized faculties, yet the Constitution provides that each organized faculty should receive at least one seat in addition to their Dean.

Thus, of the 39 elected seats, 27 are for Arts and Sciences and one is for Performing Arts, leaving 11 to be elected by the remaining organized faculties in proportion to their membership. That calculation is:
