I have been asked to review and briefly comment on the Graduate Program Proposal to initiate a Ph.D./M.S. program in psychology that was developed by the Department of Psychology at Oakland University.

The M.S. program is designed to provide students with the training and preparation needed to gain admission into a Ph.D. program in psychology or related social science discipline. It is also important to note, however, that students who complete the proposed M.S. program but decide not to pursue a Ph.D., will have a strong foundation in statistical analyses and research methodology that should give them considerable leverage for research-oriented employment in non-academic settings.

The Ph.D. program is designed to give students the opportunity to specialize in one of two broad concentrations: biological and basic processes or social and behavioral processes. The structure and coursework of each concentration, along with the intensive training in statistical analyses and research methodology, should provide students with solid training and preparation for successful entry into academic positions. 
Dear Committee Considering New Programs at Oakland University:
