

## Budget Update

*March 4, 2010*

Dear colleagues,

I'd like to take a few moments to bring you up to date on the state budget situation, especially as it relates to Oakland University.

Fiscal year 2011 is expected to be another tough budget year for Michigan. State revenues continue to decline, and the state will have to make up a significant budget shortfall that was filled last year by one-time federal stimulus funds. On the bright side, it looks increasingly unlikely that the governor will issue an executive order to cut FY2010 appropriations.

Two pieces of legislation – Senate Bills 1046 and 1047 – currently being debated in Lansing would drastically alter health care benefits for public employees, including university employees. There has also been discussion in Lansing about scaling back salaries and retirement contributions of certain public employees. We'll have to wait to see if anything comes of these discussions, but you can see what's happening: The governor and the legislature are exploring every avenue to see where further cuts can be made, and that may leave higher education vulnerable.
