#### STURNER'S MANUSCRIPT IS ACCEPTED BY AASCU

William Sturner, assistant president for administrative affairs, is the author of a manuscript entitled "Action Planning: Guidelines for Colleges and Universities," which has been accepted for publication by the American Association of State Col-

leges and Universities. Allan Ostar, executive director of the association, said the I35-page manuscript will be published in monograph form sometime this fall or winter.

The Sturner publication focuses on the theory and practice of institutional planning. The concepts of planned change (pro-active and systematic efforts to identify and attain feasible goals), and organizational development (the marshaling of an institution's human resources to insure effective, integrated planning) are examined in detail.

This conceptual framework forms the basis for specific recommendations on how to design, implement, and evaluate institutional goals and the action program needed to attain them, Sturmer said.

#### ACTION SEEKS NEW APPLICANTS

The University Year for ACTION Program (UYA) Office at Oakland University has announced that applications for admission to the program are being accepted now through Friday, August 16.

Since May, 1973, nearly 100 UYA volunteers have worked with metropolitan area social service and educational agencies, performing many valuable services on behalf of the poor. UYA volunteers receive a living allowance and stipend totaling \$3,000 plus other benefits during their year of service.

#### DEAN JOHNSON SEEKS TAIWAN SCIENCE STUDENTS

G. Philip Johnson, dean of Graduate Study, is visiting Taiwan Aug. 5 through Aug. 15 seeking graduate students for Oakland University, mainly in the science areas. Chinese government on Taiwan has special regulations that apply to their qualified students who wish to seek an education in the United States.

#### NEW TEACHER CORPS PROGRAM CYCLE BEGINS

Oakland University has received funding for a new Cycle IX Teacher Corps Program from the U.S. Office of Education. This will mark seven years of continuous funding amounting to over \$1,000,000.00 for teacher corps programs at Oakland.

During the two years of Cycle IX, July, 1974 through June, 1976, Oakland will receive approximately \$325,000 to train and retrain teachers for urban disadvantaged children.

Cooperating with the university in Cycle IX will be the Farmington schools, Boys Republic, and the St. Vincent and Sarah Fisher Home for Children. Fifteen graduate students were selected as interns from over 520 applicants drawn from a national pool. The director of the program is Jacqueline I. Lougheed, and the associate directors are Virginia M. Schuldenberg and Sidney Graber, all of the School of Education.

### LIDDLE PARTICIPATES IN RESOURCE TEAM WORKSHOPS

Edward Liddle, School of Education, serving in the capacity of consultant and curriculum specialist for Educational Development Center, Inc., recently participated in two Resource Team Workshops (RTW) for the United Science and Mathematics in the

Elementary Schools (USMES) project. This project is funded by the National Science Foundation and directed by Earle Lomon, a small-particle physicist from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The project is developing an elementary school curriculum based on an interdisciplinary real problem solving approach. Liddle has worked on the development of four units over the past two years: Consumer's Research, Small Group Dynamics, Security Devices and Advertising. He was a staff member at the RTW in Boston in April and in June at the University of California, Santa Cruz.

## TWO LIDDLE ARTICLES ACCEPTED FOR PUBLICATION

Two articles written by Ed Liddle, School of Education, have recently been accepted for publication. One, <u>Data Gathering and Generating Histograms (or Stack-ém and Graph-ém in One Fell-Swoop</u>), has been published as part of the USMES (Unified

Science and Mathematics in the Elementary School) Project being developed by Educational Development Center, Inc., Newton, Mass. The article is concerned with children's data gathering and representation during problem solving activities. The theme is having the data gathering and representation occur simultaneously so the meaningfulness of the data will be preserved.

The second, <u>Science and Non-Science in Road Runner Cartoons</u>, will be published in the Michigan Science Teacher's Association Bulletin and will also be presented at the National Convention of the School Science and Mathematics Association in November at Cincinnati, Ohio. This article deals with how one can use Road Runner Cartoons as the basis for science lessons dealing with the physical sciences. The article is a description of activities which occured in New-Charter College Natural Science Workshop during the winter of 1974.
