## **Pioneer Profile**

Pat Nicosia

When I mentioned to friends that the next person to be profiled would be Pat Nicosia, they said, “Oh, the guy with the tickets!” Yes, Pat is still the go-to guy for tickets to the Fox Theatre, the Fisher Theater, the Opera House and several venues in Sarasota, Florida, where he and his wife, Mercedes, own a second condo. But more of that later.

Pat retired in 2003, after 31 years at Oakland University, leaving as Director of Budget and Financial Planning. He received the Outstanding AP Award in 1985 and the Honorary Alumnus Award in 2003. He was also cited as Advisor of the Year several times for his work with Theta Chi Fraternity. But the achievement that he is most interested in is that he co-chaired the Oakland University All-University Fund Drive (AUF) for three years. That function was so important to him that he has continued as retiree representative to the AUF during his retirement years. “I believe strongly that retirees should remember Oakland University during the fund drive and through their bequests,” he told me. He especially promotes the idea of participating in some of the matching programs the university sponsors.

Mercy and Pat met on a blind date some 34 years ago arranged by Kathy Wilson (wife of Jack) and Emily Champagne (wife of Joe). They traveled extensively during the early years of their marriage, but travel became less important as they became more and more involved in affairs at their condo in Sarasota (he is treasurer of the association) and in the theater ticket business, but since 2014 they have been to China and cruised the Danube. They leave for a trip to Italy later this month.

The Nicosias contribute generously to Oakland University, with many of their contributions earmarked for the Music, Theatre and Dance Department (MTD). “Many of those student performers are so good,” says Pat, “that they should make it to the big time. However, the competition is so great in that field that too many of them do not make it, or wait a long time until they do. We want to help them out with scholarships and grants so they don’t start out burdened with a heavy tuition debt. They should be rewarded even when they don’t make the big stage, because many of them perform for little or no money in community programs that greatly enrich people in the area.” Pat was instrumental in raising scholarship dollars for the Meadow Brook Estate, Oakland’s Show Choir, and several scholarship endowments were established through his efforts. The annual MaTiDa Award for a member of the Meadow Brook Estate is named after the Nicosias and they fund the stipend that goes with the award.

As you might guess, the Nicosias are great theater buffs. (The Tony Awards are their favorite awards show). Pat estimates that they go to at least 45 live performances every year, here and in Sarasota, Florida. “We live 10 minutes from the largest theater in Sarasota, but we are also close to many other venues. There are about 15 stages for live theatre in Sarasota and all within 15 minutes of our condo on Lido Beach. Sarasota is the cultural center of Florida—I wouldn’t live anywhere else in the state.” Pat estimates that in the past 30 years he has sold well over a million dollars in tickets at discount prices for prime seats blocked out for him before the general public has access to them. Since his retirement, he has shared this responsibility with the Center for Student Activities. Pat remains the resource for retirees and current faculty and students get the same discounted tickets at the Center for Student Activities Box Office. Pat’s main contact there is Lori Marsh—together they make sure the Oakland community gets great seats at discounted prices.

Discounts vary for the various theaters and programs, with the deepest ones being \$20 tickets to the dress rehearsals at the Detroit Opera House. Sometimes he can obtain balcony tickets for half price for Fisher Theatre productions, depending on the popularity of the program. Though he reserves tickets well in advance (currently working on the 2017 season), for a popular play he and Lori frequently request more tickets as the demand

increases. For *Motown the Musical*, they sold 550 tickets last year, but *Miss Saigon*, when it first came to Detroit for a four-month run, was the most popular with 1200 tickets mailed out to students and faculty. (That happens to be *his* favorite show, relating it to his own experiences in Korea, where he served during the Vietnam War). He sometimes is working on 20 shows at a time, matching purchasers' preferences for dates and seating. It is a daunting task, and he has received no reimbursement for any of his time and trouble, nor does he expect any.

In his free time Pat exercises regularly at the Older Persons' Commission (OPC) in Rochester and at the condo's recreation area in Florida. He conferred with staff at OPC and Oakland's Recreation Center to determine the best equipment for a fitness center and is pleased that his condo association now has one of the best-equipped programs in the area. He also takes advantage of his time in Rochester to resume the piano lessons he began 14 years ago. When in Sarasota he attends Oakland's regional engagement activities (formerly Winter College) each year, and this year is on the planning committee for the reunion dinner in Sarasota.

Pat relishes his relationships with Oakland University, past and present. "It was great working at Oakland, and I miss the people. I'm excited with all the new buildings, especially the Elliott Tower." As retiree representative for the OU Fund Drive he expresses strong feelings about returning back to the University financially, especially through endowments, bequests and annual giving programs, such as the All-University Fund Drive, that provide matching funds. "It's a way to leave your mark on the University," he says.

The "man with the tickets" has left a *big* mark on the University, and he is still blazing a trail.
