

GOLF COURSE OPENS NEXT WEEK

The Oakland University Katke-Cousins Golf Course will open July 1, university officials have announced.

Nine holes will be playable on that date. The remaining nine holes will open about September 1. The course will be open seven days a week from dawn to dusk.

Full-time students (those carrying ten credits or more) will pay \$2 for nine holes and \$3 for eighteen during the week and \$4 and \$6 on weekends. Part-time students will pay \$1.50 more.

Faculty, staff, and alumni will pay \$3 and \$5 during the week and \$5 and \$7 on weekends.

Part-time students and spouses and minor dependent children of students and faculty will pay \$3.50 and \$5.50 during the week and \$5.50 and \$7.50 on the weekends.

Guests will pay \$4 and \$6 during the week and \$6 and \$8 on the weekends.

There will also be 200 public memberships available at \$100 per membership. The public members will pay the \$3.50 \$7.50 greens fees rates. Persons interested in obtaining a public membership should contact Bill Pfaff in the Sports and Recreation building, 377-3190.

The golf course was made possible through contributions from Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Katke and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Cousins, and the Board of Trustees recently named the course after the donors.

HOUSE PASSES OU APPROPRIATION

The State House of Representatives has passed a higher education appropriation bill that includes \$14.2 million for Oakland.

The house bill, passed last Tuesday, recommended that \$492 million be appropriated for the state colleges and universities for the coming fiscal year. The house bill contains \$1.1 million more than the higher education appropriation bill approved earlier by the senate and \$16.4 million more than Governor Milliken had recommended.

The \$14.2 million for Oakland is identical to the senate recommendation for the university and is \$700,000 more than the governor's recommendation. If finally approved at that figure, it would be approximately \$1 million more state money than the university was allocated in 1975-76. The bill now goes to a conference committee to resolve differences between the senate and house. There also remains the question of resolving the differences between the legislature and the

HEALTH CARE AVAILABLE TO OU COMMUNITY

All members of the OU community, including alumni and students' spouses, may take advantage of weekly medical services at the Graham Health Center. Services include physician coverage that permits evaluation and treatment of most acute and chronic medical problems, laboratory procedures, and allergy injections. A gynecologist is available to students by appointment.

The fee for a routine office call is \$7 for students and \$10 for all other patients. The center can bill insurance carriers for covered services. Health care is offered every weekday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. A physician is available between 9-11:30 a.m. and between 1-3:30 p.m. on a walk-in basis. Effective July 1, 1976, appointments can be made between 2-3:30 p.m.

G-M Underwriters offers a low cost student health insurance plan which covers almost everything performed at the health center including office calls. Information can be obtained by calling 377-2341.
