EDF proposals due Nov. 2

The Teaching and Learning Committee's Educational Development Fund (EDF) is intended to support efforts aimed at improving the quality of instruction offered by academic units at Oakland University. Specifically, academic units are invited to request funding for stipulated improvements in teaching and learning. Support to enhance faculty readiness to deal with instructional improvements may be included. It is understood, however, that normal costs of instruction will not be funded.

Questions and comments may be referred to Steven Miller, chairperson, Teaching and Learning Committee (7-2334) or to Lewis Pino, Director, Research and Instructional Services, (7-3222).

Since it is probable that more requests will be received than can be approved, each proposer is urged to stipulate as clearly as possible what is to be done, why it is important that the work be done, and how the effort described is related to the

plans and aspirations of the unit in question. A clear, concise (no more than five pages, please) narrative is essential, with the Committee reserving the right to call for such external assistance as may be deemed appropriate during the competitive review process.

Each request will consist of a cover page carrying a title and an abstract and signed by the principal investigator, the head of the unit seeking support, and the appropriate dean; a narrative section, limited to five pages; and a budget page delineating in detail the costs considered necessary. The extent of cost-sharing on the part of the unit seeking support should be indicated.

Each EDF grant is limited to a maximum of \$1200, with the committee reserving the right to negotiate reductions if necessary.

Completed applications (please provide 12 copies) will be accepted in the Office of Research and Instructional Services, 364 South Foundation, until 5:00 PM on Friday, November 2, 1979. Every effort will be made to announce awards before the end of the semester.

For purposes of the competition the definition of "academic unit" is not limited to departments. Areas, segments of departments, and cross-disciplinary units offering concentrations are specifically included.

Board seeks \$6.9 million

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved a capital outlay request for 1980-81 of \$6,969,000.

The funds would be used to complete financing of Classroom-Office Building No. 2, additional programming for a proposed addition to the Kresge Library, and for a variety of remodeling projects.

The major portion of the capital outlay request is for \$5,267,000 that will complete construction costs on the new classroom building now under construction.

Some \$400,000 is sought for the Kresge Library addition of some 200,000 gross square feet. The addition would contain 2,195 student stations, 100 staff stations, and room for 600,000 volumes. The Bureau of Facilities has already approved Rossetti Associates, Inc. as architect for the project and released \$40,000 for the preparation of schematic planning documents. Total cost of the project will be

\$9,362,500 with a tentative completion date of 1984-85.

The university is asking for \$35,000 in planning funds for a proposed \$8,465,000 science building. No state funds have yet been authorized for this project.

Major remodeling and additional requests have been made for remodeling of Hannah Hall areas for laboratories, \$449,000; remodeling of Dodge Hall areas for a human anatomy laboratory, \$242,000; an energy management plan to modify the existing Honeywell control system to report mechanical system malfunctions and readjust systems controls, \$173,000; roof modification and replacement on North Foundation Hall, \$138,000; remodel estate buildings for student activities, \$127,000; and air-cool South Foundation Hall, \$138,000. These projects are listed in order of priority. If funded, they are slated for completion in the 1980-81 fiscal year.

Robert J. McGary, assistant vice president for business affairs and controller, has announced changes in the meal and mileage rates for university travel.

Effective immediately, the new rates pay \$16 a day for meals (\$3 breakfast, \$4 lunch, and \$9 dinner) while mileage has been increased from 17 to 18 cents. The old meal rate was \$14 per day maximum.

The 1979 Oakland University Blood Drive will be held October 30-31, in the Crockery of the Oakland Center. Traditionally one of the largest and most successful drives in the Tri-County area, the Oakland Drive annually yields nearly five hundred pints of blood for the American Red Cross.

Volunteer donors may schedule an appointment for either day (October 30 from 3 to 9 p.m., or October 31, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.) at either the CIPO Office, 49 Oakland Center, or Vandenberg Hall Main Desk. By scheduling their appointments, donors can assure themselves of swift processing through the blood unit.

Fall sports are successful

As the Oakland University fall sports teams near the midpoint of their 1979 sports seasons, the Pioneers are enjoying a successful year.

As of October 12, the women's tennis and volleyball along with the men's cross country squads are supporting winning records, while the men's soccer team, plagued with injuries throughout the season, are just under the .500 mark.

Senior tennis player Judi Stiff (Royal Oak) is undefeated in eight matches at both number one singles and number one doubles. In singles action, she has won 96 games while losing only 29 for a team-high 76.8 percentage. Freshman Nancy Golding (Rochester) is Stiff's doubles partner and they have combined to win 70.9 percent of their games.

Golding, OU's number three singles player, is 5-3 for the year, while sophomore Karen Wiecha (Dearborn Heights) is 6-2 at number two singles. Junior Jody Woloszynski (Dearborn) is 6-1 at number four singles. Freshmen Tanya Newman (Southfield) and Lisa Webber (Fraser) have 3-5 and 6-2 marks respectively at number five and six singles.

In doubles competition, Wiecha and freshman Rosemary Vella (Rochester) have a 4-2 mark at number two doubles, while Woloszynski and Newman are 6-1 at number three spot.

The women's volleyball squad, under the direction of coach Jan Peters, are also having a fine fall season with a 10-5 slate overall and an impressive 5-1 mark in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC). Juniors Lisa Zimba (Defond) and Anne McGraw (Warren) along with freshman Diane Zack (Jacksonville, Fla.) lead the squad while sophomore Gigi Mikula (Warren) and freshmen Sue Burbank (Utica) and Pat Nolra (Warren) complete the starting lineup.

The men's cross country team are 3-1 for the season under the guidance of coach Steve Hebold. The OU harriers have victories over the University of Detroit (17-43), Albion College (24-32) and Oliver College (15-47). The triumph over Oliver College was the largest victory margin in the school's history. The lone setback came at the feet of the University of Northern Kentucky, 33-24. Junior co-captain Steve Swarts (Port Huron) and sophomore co-captain Mark Carter (Pontiac) have led OU most of the season. Swarts has a five-mile best-time of 26:00, while Carter has a season-best time of 26:23. Freshmen Kyle Spann (Midland) and Tim Welch (Royal Oak) have added considerable depth to the squad and have season-best respective times of 27:10 and 27:19.

The OU soccer team has a 4-6 record after 10 games this season. The OU booters have faced a difficult schedule against nationally-ranked Cleveland State University and the University of Evansville and other schools like the University of Notre

Dame, Michigan State University, the University of Michigan and Western Illinois University this season.

Scoring only four goals in their first four games, the Pioneers managed wins over Ohio University (2-1 in overtime) and Spring Arbor (1-0) but lost to Wooster College 2-0 in the season opener and to Cleveland State University, 4-1. After being shutout by Western Illinois University and the University of Notre Dame by identical 2-0 scores, the Pioneers exploded for six goals in a 6-1 victory over the University of Dayton to raise their season record to 3-4. A 2-1 loss to Lewis University was followed by a 1-0 victory over Michigan State University as junior Joe Wilden (Utica) scored the game's only goal against the Spartans. The University of Evansville then downed OU 3-0.

Freshman Larry Field (Wyndmoor, Pa.) leads the team in scoring with five assists, while junior Dave Wandeloski (Utica) has two goals and two assists.
