## Faculty Reemployed & Promoted

Actions leading to reemployment or promotion for 30 OU faculty were approved by the Board of Trustees June 20.

The actions take effect August 15 of 1979 or 1980 depending on terms of the faculty agreement.

Promoted from associate to full professor were Frederick W. Obear, chemistry, Arun K. Roy, biological sciences, and W. Dorsey Hammond, teacher education (1979). Obear, academic vice president and provost, was promoted in a separate action to recognize his contributions to the university.

Promoted from assistant to associate professor with tenure were: Douglas D. Gregory, economics and management, Yau Yan Hung, engineering (1979), Denis M. Callewaert and Christine S. Sloane, chemistry, Stanley W. Hollingsworth, music, John W. Atlas and Alfred W. Stransky, teacher education (1980).

Two instructors were promoted to the rank of assistant professor, effective August 15, 1980. They are Marilyn J. Lotas and Pamela G. Reed, both in nursing. Ramune V. Mikaila, also of nursing, was re-employed as a special instructor. Carol E. Halsted, teacher education, was re-employed and transferred from assistant professor to special instructor, effective August 15, 1980.

Fourteen assistant professors who will be re-employed at that rank on the same date in 1980 are: Beverly K. Berger, physics; David J. Downing, mathematical sciences; I. Theodore Landau, psychology; Daphna R. Oliver, biological sciences;

Jean E. Roberts, mathematical sciences; Claude K. Rowland and Donald S. Schwerin, political science; Keith E. Stanovich, psychology; Charlotte V. Stokes art and art history; Stephen J. Wright, mathematical sciences; Alphonso R. Bellamy, management; Frank J. Giblin, health sciences; and Mary Ellen Sapp and Kenneth E. Smith, teacher education.

Two associate professors, Miron Srano, economics and management, and James H. McCormick, teacher education, were re-employed as associate professors with tenure (1980).

## Board Approves Programs

New programs of study and a new credit requirement for an existing one have been approved by the trustees.

The change in requirements for the medical technology program requires completion of 136 credits rather than 128. The change is consistent with credit requirements for similar programs in the state.

New degree programs are a B.S. in Industrial Health and Safety to meet the growing need for persons trained in environmental health and safety, particularly in an industrial setting; an M.S. in Applied Mathematics to provide broad training for application in an industrial setting; an M.S. in Applied Statistics to meet the growing demand for persons who can make a statistical analysis of numerical data; and a specialist in education

degree, an individually-planned program for persons who already possess a master's degree. The mathematics and speciality in education programs are subject to legislative approval.

In addition, the trustees approved an interdisciplinary major in biochemistry. The program is offered by the Departments of Biological Sciences and Chemistry to answer a growing demand for students with these skills.

The trustees have authorized the School of Performing Arts, under auspices of the faculty council for the school, to recommend primary appointments of faculty in dance, and authorized the Institute of Biological Sciences to recommend primary appointments of faculty. Previously, faculty in the institute had primary appointments in an academic department. Institute appointments will be made for faculty assigned primarily to research responsibilities.

David L. Ronis, psychology, presented a paper entitled "Comparing the Magnitude of Effects in Factorial ANOVA Designs" at the Midwest Psychological Association Convention held in early May in Chicago.

Sudol, learning skills, was a panelist in the Human Services section and secretary of the American Romanticism section at the annual meeting of the Northeast Modern Language Association in Hartford, Connecticut, March 29-April 1. His short article "More About the Punic Wars, Right After These Messages" recently appeared in the *Jeu D'Esprit* section of *College Composition and Communication*.

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Jane D. Eberwein, English, delivered a paper on "The Literary Image of John Eliot," for the Conference on Christianity and Literature regional meeting held recently at Saint Mary's College, Indiana.

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Donald E. Morse, English, was an invited participant in the seminar, "James Joyce and the Celtic Consciousness," held at St. Michael's College of the University of Toronto in association with Waddington Galleries. Other participants included Marshall McLuhan, Leslie Fiedler, and the Irish artist, Louis Le Brocqy.

Morse has a short story, "Stoney Grey Soil," in the spring issue of *Green's Magazine*. The story describes a middle aged brother and sister living on an Irish farm, and was begun when Morse was on sabbatical in Ireland.

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Five Oakland University nursing students have been selected for scholarships sponsored by the Oakland County Medical Society Auxiliary.

The auxiliary awards five OU scholarships each year. Recipients are selected by the faculty of the OU School of Nursing on the basis of academic excellence and professional promise.

The winners are Jacqueline Long, Waterford; Lori Kaschner, Grand Ledge; Margaret Mollica, Pontiac; Jean Rouner, West Bloomfield; and Dianna Welke, Roseville.

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Sid Mitra, School of Economics and Management, presented a paper on International Central Banking at the International Meetings of the Atlantic Economic Association in Vienna, Austria. Mitra also chaired a session on Consumer Economics.

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A manuscript written by Audrey I. Marriner, director of specialized programs and marketing for the Division of Continuing Education, was selected to be published in

the July 1979 issue of *The Forum for Continuing Education*.

The paper, "Legal and Social Work Principles for Adult Protective Services Workers: An In-Service Training Program," deals with a continuing education program that was developed and conducted statewide for the Michigan Department of Social Services.

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## MB Luncheons Start July 1

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# Gifts, Grants Total \$841,507

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Mid-April to mid-June was a banner fund raising period for Oakland University.

The board of Trustees accepted \$841,507 in gifts and grants to the institution at the June session.

Among major fund sources were the National Institutes of Health with four grants for \$344,441, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare with a \$72,274 award, and the State of Michigan with two grants totaling \$131,708. Some \$67,727 was received in support of the Meadow Brook Music Festival and/or Theatre.

The State of Michigan grants went to Richard Stamps, sociology and anthropology, and John Cameron, art and art history, who received \$36,708 for a pilot program "An Archaeological and Architectural Survey of Oakland County," and to the physical plant where \$95,000 will be spent to replace high temperature hot water heating lines for the southwest corner of the campus.

The HEW funds are under the direction of Geraldine Felton, School of Nursing, to support the teaching of ethnic diversity in a new program.

The NIH awards follow: \$213,199 to Venkat N. Reddy, Institute of Biological

Sciences, for support and indirect costs of a program entitled "Intraocular Transport;" \$39,060 to Arun K. Roy of the Institute for research on "Regulation of Alpha 2U Globulin in the Rat;" \$47,513 to Nalin J. Unakar, biology, for research entitled "Morphological Studies in Experimental Cataracts;" and \$44,669 under direction of Frederick W. Obeir, academic vice president and provost, to provide biomedical research support grants for faculty.

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Larry Bartalucci, registrar, reminds students who will complete requirements for a degree during the summer session that they are required to file an application for degree form no later than 4 p.m. on July 10.

The application forms are now available in the registrar's office in 161 NFH. These forms must be submitted to the cashier's office, 120 NFH, along with a \$10 application fee, no later than the July 10 deadline.

Bartalucci said students who apply for summer session degrees and meet all academic requirements by August 16 will be honored at the September 15 commencement exercises along with the spring graduating class.
