## Indian miniatures on display

The art of Indian miniature painting is featured in the exhibit "Visions of Courty India" which opened February 18 in the Meadow Brook Art Gallery.

The exhibit runs through March 25, and it is supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts in Washington, D.C. Most of the works have never been shown previously in the United States.

The public was invited to a free program on the opening day of the exhibit. Featured was a lecture by Walter Spink of the University of Michigan and Indian music by OU faculty member Sid Mittra and the Mittra family ensemble.

The exhibition consists of 80 miniature paintings selected by William G. Archer from the comprehensive collection he and his wife Mildred have assembled during many years of travel and residence in India. The miniatures are from six to eight inches in width and from 10 to 12 inches in depth.

Archer is now keeper emeritus of the Indian section of the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, England. For the past 20 years Archer has written extensively on the subject of Indian miniature painting.

Works in the OU exhibit illustrate the development of the Punjab Hills art styles. Religion and history, manners and poetry, and symbolism and song are all intertwined and reflect the various "schools" of painting that grew up around the Indian courts from the seventeenth to the mid-nineteenth centuries.

In the catalog that accompanies the exhibit, Archer has written a full history and critical analysis of Indian miniature. The catalog is available to Gallery Associate members for \$6 and to others for \$12. Publication of the catalog was subsidized by a grant from the JDR 3rd Fund of the National Endowment for the Arts.

The Meadow Brook Art Gallery is located in Wilson Hall. The gallery is open to visitors at no charge from 1 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, from 2 to 6:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, and during Meadow Brook Theatre performances.

# IN THE SPOTLIGHT

**British organ** virtuoso Peter Hurford will appear in recital March 11 in Vamer Recital Hall.

The all Bach program will begin at 3 p.m. Tickets are \$4 for general admission and \$3 for OU students and senior citizens.

The artist recently resigned after 20 years as master of music at St. Albans Cathedral in order to devote full time to a recording and concert career. He continues to head the St. Albans International Organ Festival which he first organized in 1963.

Hurford is now recording the complete organ works of Bach for the British Broadcasting Corporation and for Argo Records. His 1979-80 concert tour will take him to America, Australia, New Zealand, and Eastern and Western Europe.

Critics have cited him for his musicianship and for his interpretive skills. **The Gramophone** critic called Hurford "arguably the best Bach player in England and one of the best anywhere."

Hurford feels that the organ is "capable of as much finesse as the violin" and that the organ should be restored to the mainstream of music-making.

Before starting his concert career in 1958 Hurford studied at the Royal College of Music and at Cambridge University where he took degrees in music and in law.

The program included the Concerto No. 2 in A minor (after Vivaldi BWV 593); Trio in D Minor (583); Alla Breve (589); Fantasia and Fugue in G minor (542); Sonata No. 6 in G (530); Chorale Preludes; and the Prelude and Fugue in B minor (544).

Hurford will perform on the Kyes organ, an instrument designed in the tradition of organs built in the Baroque era during the time of Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) by Casavant Freres Limite. The organ was a gift of Mrs. Roger M. Kyes of Bloomfield Hills, a charter trustee emerita and a patroness of organ music.

**The Deadly Game**, a thriller based on Friedrich Durrenmatt's provocative and suspenseful novel **Traps**, will open a four week run at the Meadow Brook Theatre on Thursday, March 1 at 8:30 p.m.

James Yaffe, the mystery writer, has written the play based on the Durrenmatt novel. **The Deadly Game** tells the story of three retired men of law on a remote mountain in Switzerland who amuse themselves by going through the legal ceremony of prosecuting strangers who drop in. A traveling salesman is their guest on a snowy evening. Although their "deadly game" seems foolish to him, he agrees to it to humor his hosts.

After a little social and amiable conversation, the retired prosecutor discovers a plausible case. He accuses the salesman of having murdered his employer.

Charles Nolte, who staged the Meadow Brook production of **The Caine Mutiny Court-martial** earlier this season, will direct **The Deadly Game**.
