MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

Since I arrived at Oakland in September 2015, many exciting programs, events and initiatives have been implemented at OU Libraries, enabling students and faculty across campus to engage in collaborative research, hands-on learning and much more. Highlights of our collective accomplishments include: opening of the Krompart-Hildebrand Digitization Lab and the Mike Roger Collection of congressional papers and documents; digitization of student newspapers; and a Makerspace to inspire student collaboration and creativity.

We have increased student access to scholarly information critical to their education and success through the promotion of affordable textbooks and the adoption of Open Educational Resources across campus. We have provided quality research assistance and information literacy instruction to our community of scholars, and increased engagement



with our local communities through events, cultural celebrations and shared programs.

Through the development of a strong strategic plan for the library, in conjunction with the launch of the University's largest comprehensive campaign, OU Libraries is poised for continued success.

KRESGE LIBRARY FLOOD UPDATE

By now, most of you have heard the news about the unfortunate flood that occurred in Kresge Library due to the frigid temperatures we experienced a couple of weeks ago. A water pipe burst in the ceiling over Frankie's Cafe during the early morning hours on February 1. Restoration experts were called in immediately to extract the standing water, remove damaged equipment/materials, and begin remediation of all areas impacted. Significant water damage to the first and second floors caused the library to close for seven days.

Kresge Library was able to reopen most of the building to the campus community on February 7, with limited hours of operation and limited availability of some services. It remains unclear at this point when the library will be able to resume full operations on a 24-hour basis. A decision will be made when all areas affected by flooding have been remediated and deemed safe for public use.



Areas of the library that are currently inaccessible include Frankie's Cafe, some meeting and study rooms, and the entire lower floor. In addition, some library services – including

Archives and Special Collections access, the Makerspace and others – may be offline or available on a limited basis until further notice.

We appreciate your support and patience during this time as we work tirelessly to make the library accessible for students 24/7.

Help protect OU's historical archives to prevent future losses with a gift to the library. Several funds, including the Charter Challenge Endowment, the Phillip and Barbara Williams Endowment, and the Krompart-Hildebrand Digitization Fund support digitization and preservation activities to ensure materials are protected and accessible for generations to come.

NEW COLLECTION



Actor, producer, writer and OU alum Curtis Armstrong, has donated twenty boxes packed full of memorabilia from his career in film and television to the University's archives. Armstrong, a 1975 graduate of Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art, is best known for his roles in "Risky Business" and "Revenge of the Nerds" and his work on shows, such as "New Girl" and "Supernatural."

Donated items include an original copy of the first script for "Risky Business," behind-the-scenes photos, character biographies, journals, letters, and press clippings he has accumulated during his 40-year professional career. Much of his collection will be cataloged, preserved and digitized. Materials will be available for public viewing at Kresge Library and used in film studies and theatre classes at OU.

Armstrong returned to campus earlier this month for a public speaking engagement with the campus community, which highlighted his acting career and his OU memories.

BOARD CHAIR NAMED

Teckla Rhoads has been named chair of the newly-formed Board of Advocacy and Resource Development. Rhoads and her late husband Mike are longtime supporters of the library and the University. Both served as past presidents of the Friends of Kresge Library organization.

Rhoads retired from General Motors Design



in 2017 as Executive Director, Global Industrial Design. In this role she led the teams responsible for the visual brand expressions for the GM brands and the company, including graphics and corporate identity, photography and video, environmental design, auto shows and events and merchandise development.

Her 34 years at GM Design also included experience as Director of NA Design Operations and the opportunity to work globally with the nine design studios. Rhoads received her BFA in Industrial Design from the College for Creative Studies. A passionate advocate for arts education, Rhoads devotes much of her time engaging with students, teachers and parents to encourage the pursuit of careers in the creative arts.

Rhoads also serves on the Board of Directors for the Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit, Board of Directors for Paint Creek Center for the Arts, the Michigan Design Council, and Board of Directors for the Concours of the Americas.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY





MODERN AND FLEXIBLE STUDY SPACES



New furniture has been installed on the 3rd floor of Kresge Library. A contemporary take on the traditional study carrel, the new pods are a seamless blend of aesthetics and functionality. The pods create a quiet and comfortable retreat for busy OU students, ensuring privacy to focus on tasks while allowing users to maintain their connection to the surrounding open environment. Students also have the ability to charge electronic devices while sitting at their personal table tops, which provide adequate space to spread out textbooks and laptops.

FACULTY/STAFF FOCUS

SPARC OPEN EDUCATION LEADERSHIP PROGRAM



SPARC (the Scholarly Publishing and Academic Resources Coalition) works to enable the open sharing of research outputs and educational materials in order to democratize access to knowledge, accelerate discovery, and increase the return on our investment in research and education. Last year, Julia Rodriguez, associate professor and nursing, health sciences and scholarly communications librarian, was selected to participate in the SPARC Open Education Leadership Program, an intensive professional development program designed to empower library professionals with the knowledge, skills, and connections to lead successful open education initiatives that benefit students. The two-semester program blends online, peer-to-peer, and project-based learning to build a comprehensive understanding of the open education space coupled with practical know-how to take action on campus and beyond. Fellows participate in a 24-member cohort that becomes a vibrant community of practice, enhanced by expert instructors and mentorship support.

Rodriguez spent the Fall 2018 semester of the SPARC leadership program critically reading, pondering and tweeting about Open Educational Resources (OER) and Open Educational Practices. She developed resources to better educate the OU community about OER and affordable course materials options. Rodriguez drafted and submitted a campus plan for an Affordable Course Materials Initiative, which was endorsed by the Provost in December 2018.

For her capstone project, Rodriguez will conduct a comprehensive OER readiness and environmental scan of 3-5 departments with the highest enrollment courses to gather data about current practices, structures, policies, attitudes and course material usage to determine which departments are best positioned to switch to OER or low-cost alternatives. A team of collaborators and supporters interested in working toward greater affordability in support of student success will be gathered to launch the campus Affordable Course Materials Initiative.

FELLOWSHIP AWARDED

Emily Spunagle, assistant professor and humanities librarian, and her collaborator, Megan Peiser, assistant professor of



english, have been awarded the Bibliographical Society of America (BSA) and the American Society for Eighteenth Century Studies (ASECS) Fellowship of \$3,000 for their project "Gender, Disability, and Finding Women in the Archives: Establishing the Provenance of the Marguerite Hicks Collection, 1660-1820." They plan to use this money to travel to the British Library, which holds significant correspondence between Marguerite Hicks and Maggs Brothers antiquarian book dealers, as she began assembling her collection in the late 1930s.

NEW ONLINE COURSE

OU students now have the opportunity to self-enroll in a freestanding, online course designed to help users learn more about effectively reading academic journal articles. *Reading Scholarly Articles* was developed by Amanda Nichols Hess, associate professor, e-learning, instructional technology, and education librarian; and Joanna Thielen, assistant professor, research data librarian and science librarian for biological sciences, chemistry and physics. The pair gathered input from other library faculty to make the three-lesson e-course a broader resource for more academic areas. Students who enroll in the course can pick subject areas to explore so that the knowledge they gain is transferable to their major, area of interest, or future career.

Deneen will be graduating from OU this spring with a BA in Marketing and a minor in Business Analytics.


