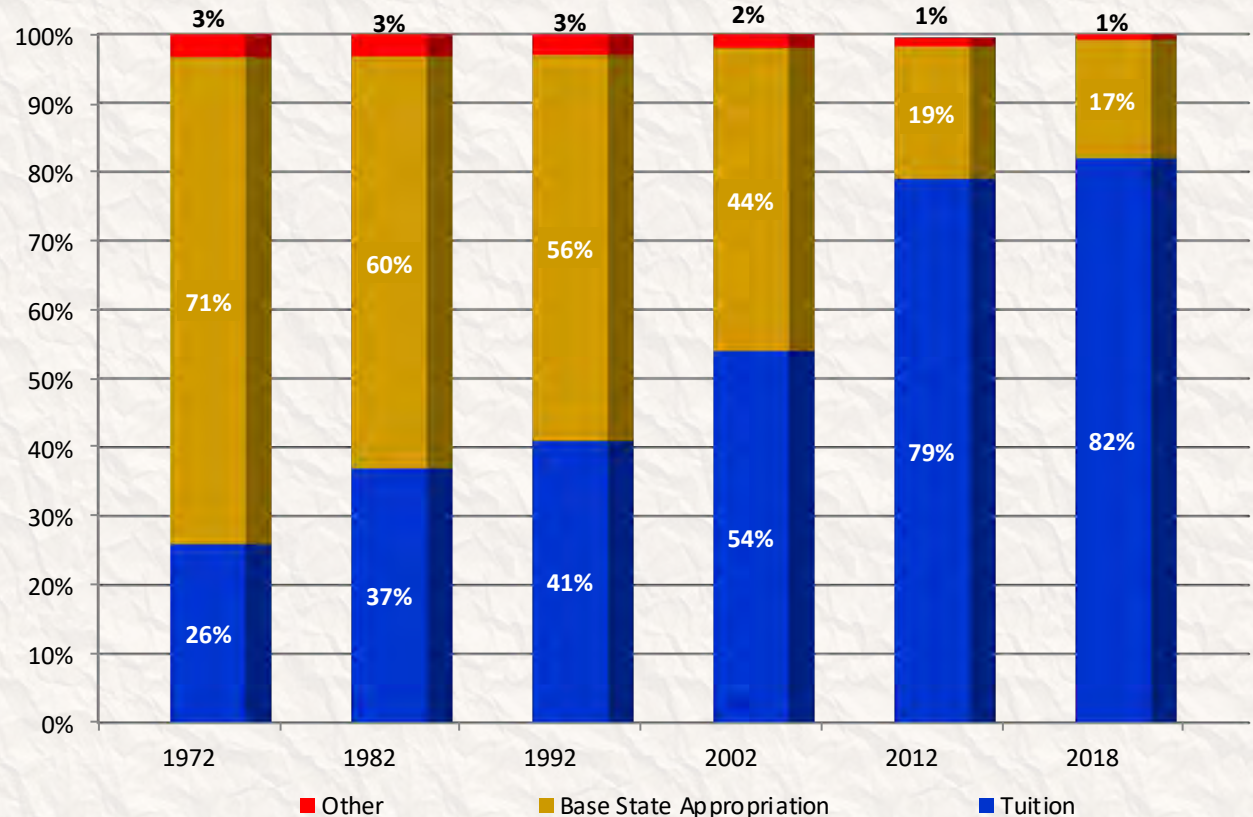

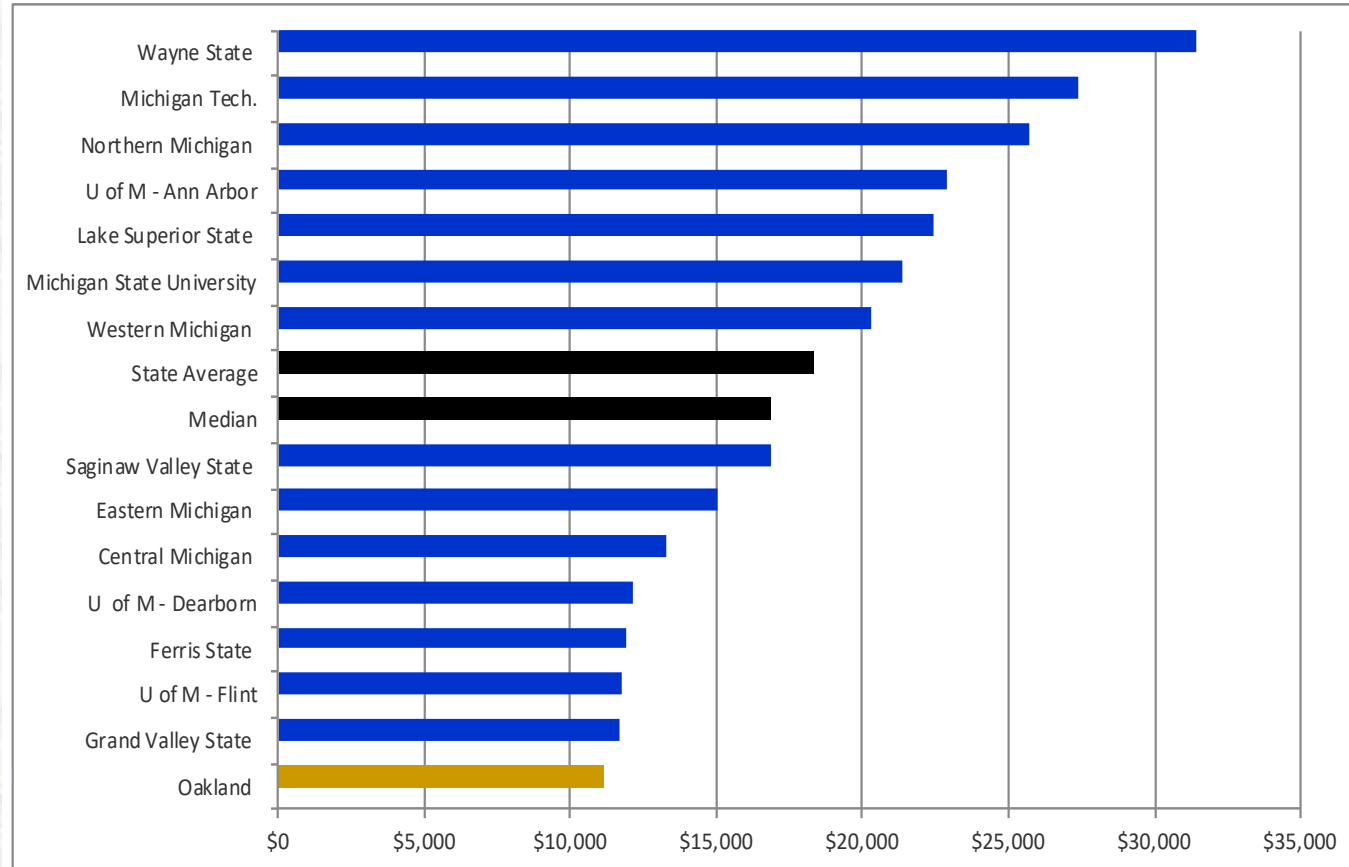
# Declining State Appropriations

- **Largest FY 2019 percent increase, 3.1%, in state funding versus to 2% overall increase**
- **Major Lam Duck Issues**

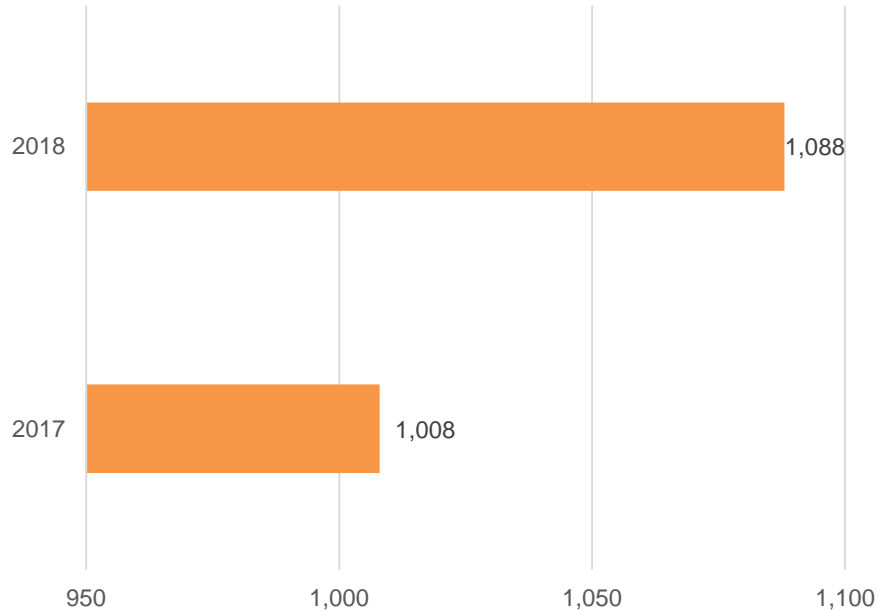
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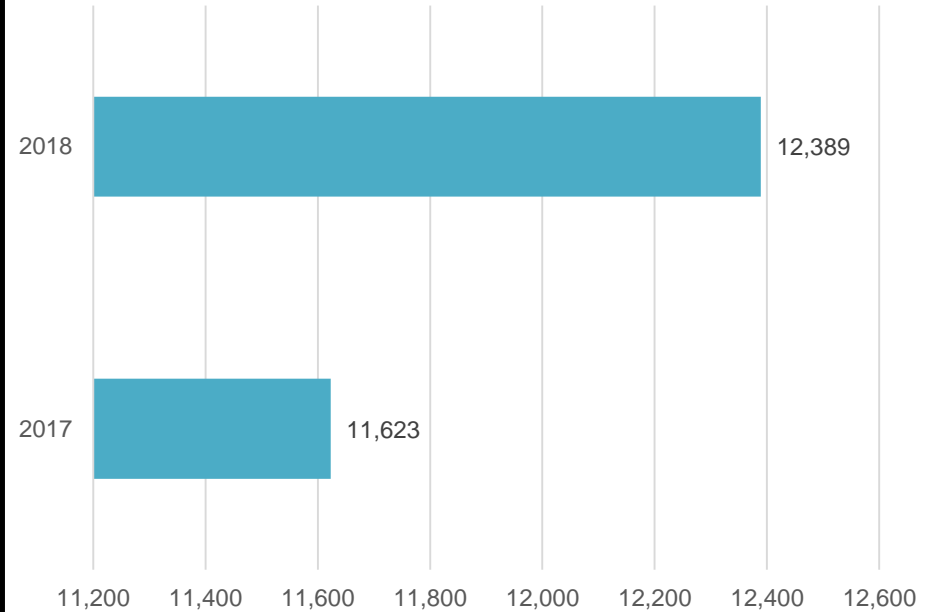
# Fall Enrollment (excluding pre-nursing)



Headcount

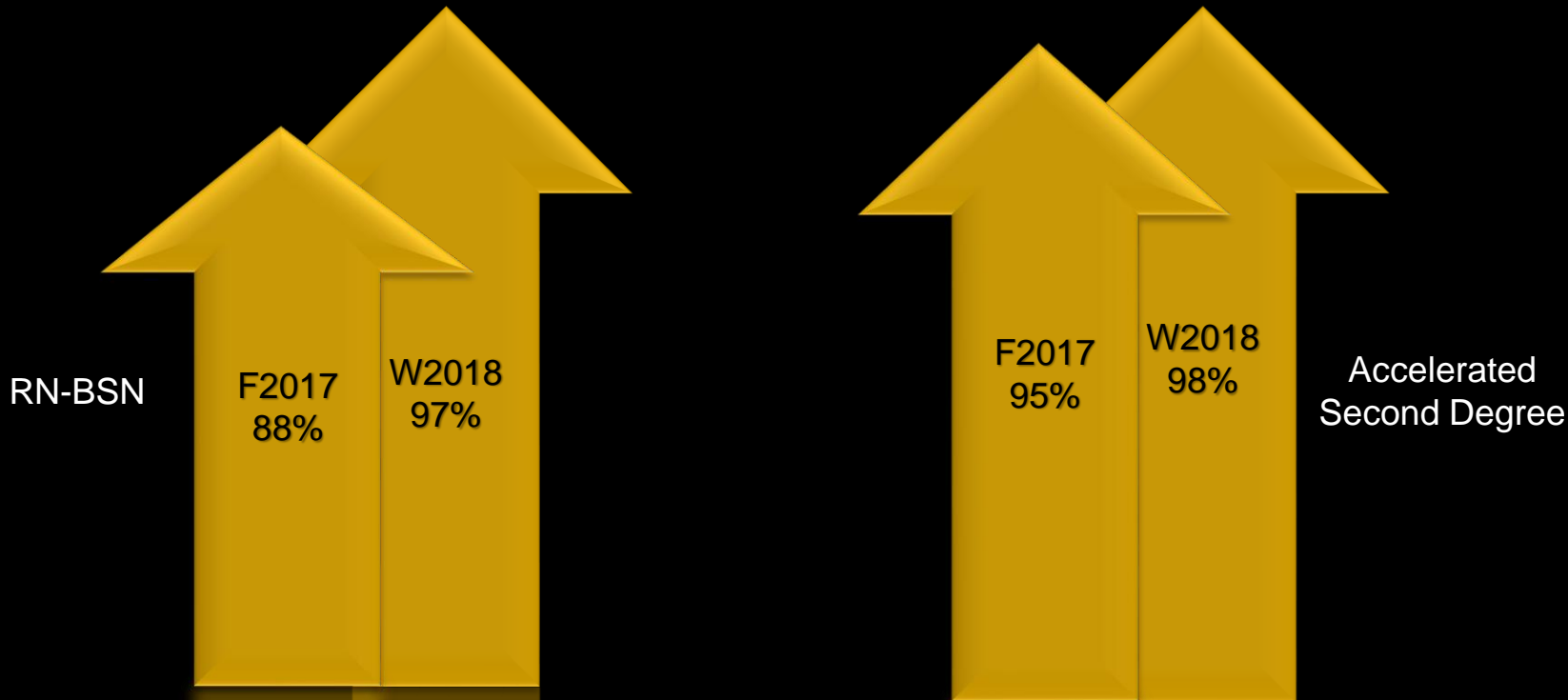

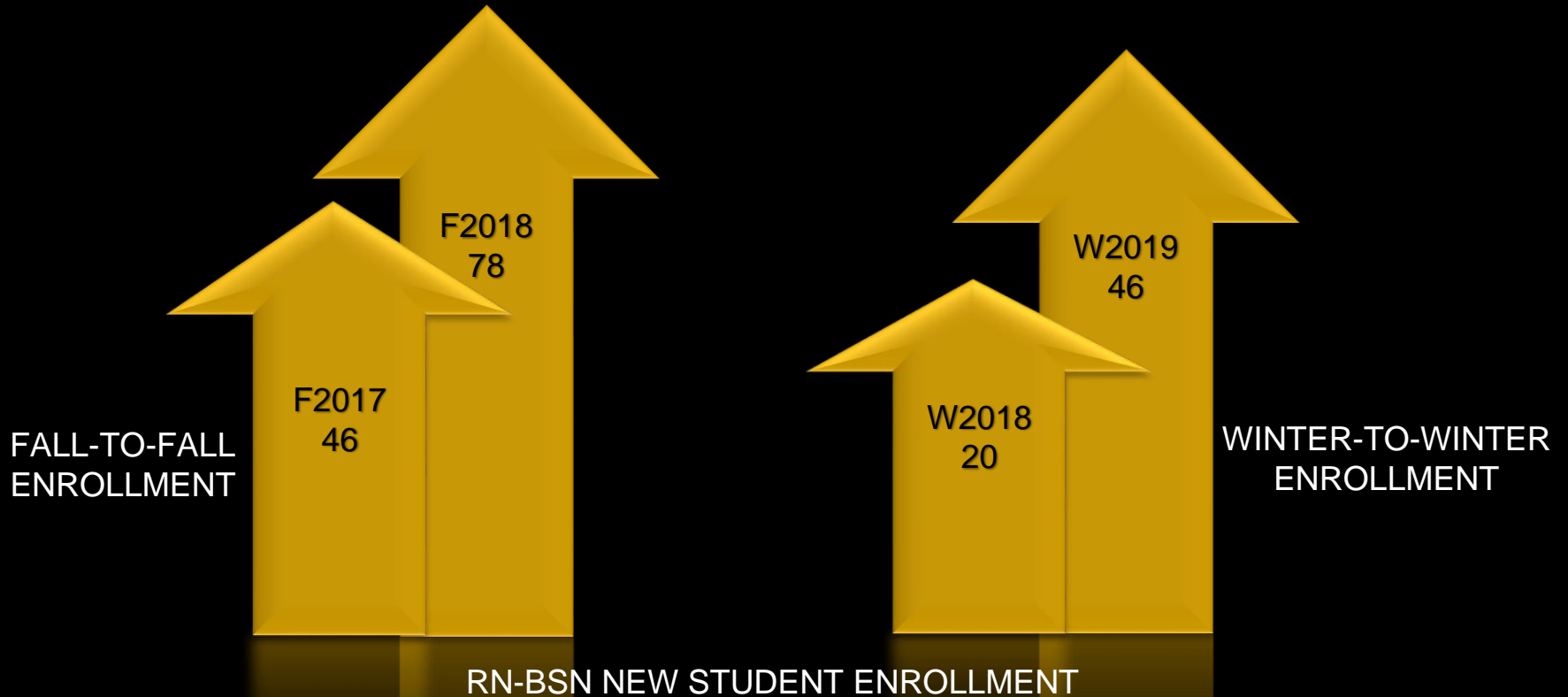

## Findings

Across all discharge elements, there were significant differences ( $p < 0.001$ ) between inpatient and outpatient settings. The mean range of documentation in discharge summaries was 18% to 98.1% in inpatient settings and 55.6% in outpatient.

The worst performing measures were related to medication: "received names of do not take medications" and "rationale provided for do not take medications"

The mean percentage of inpatients receiving discontinued medications was 95% compared to 2.6% for outpatients. The unit-level mean percentage of discontinued medications was 2.6% for outpatients.

## Abstract

This research project was to describe the psychological impact of perinatal loss on the mothers who had a subsequent pregnancy. Perinatal loss is defined as an infant during pregnancy or soon thereafter who died. This study explored the concerns and emotional responses of mothers who experienced perinatal loss and how it impacted their subsequent pregnancy. The sample consisted of 11 female students from the Midwestern School of Nursing who each had a subsequent pregnancy. The study was conducted using an online survey that was sent to participants and over half of the participants felt that their experience was embarrassing and surprising when they reported being fearful, and some did report feeling guilty for another child after their loss. A significant finding was that their parenting was not impacted, but some did report feeling guilty for another child after their loss. The findings related to perinatal loss and subsequent pregnancy are primarily related to the mother's healing and the impact of the perinatal loss experience.

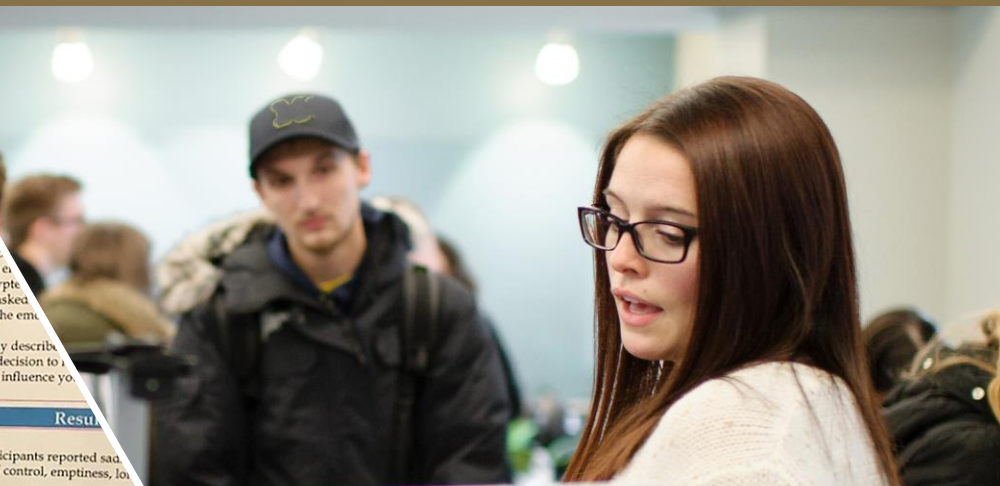

## Results

- Question 1:
- A majority of participants reported sadness, heartbreak, loss of control, emptiness, loss of belief.
  - Two participants reported being surprised to know they were pregnant until they miscarried in the toilet.
  - Two participants reported feeling "punished for" because they lost their child.
- Question 2:
- Many participants reported being fearful of losing another child but they were also hopeful, desperate, nervous, determined to try again.
  - Three participants reported struggling with infertility issues years after the initial loss.
- Question 3:
- Half the participants said the loss did not impact their parenting but they were also hopeful, desperate, nervous, determined to try again.
  - Three participants mentioned being grateful for their children whether it was for the child they had before the loss or the child they had after the loss.
