An OU alumnus and 2005 Wilson Award Winner is focusing his burgeoning academic career on helping to address the human health challenge of increasing bacterial resistance to antibiotics.

Dr. Steven D. Townsend, now an assistant professor of chemistry at Vanderbilt University, recently directed a research study on antimicrobial activity of carbohydrates in human breast milk. Results of the study were presented at the annual meeting of the American Chemical Society in

August.

As this [Vanderbilt University news article](#) reveals, more than 23,000 people die in this country each year as a result of bacterial resistance. Kudos to Dr. Townsend for working to stem this loss of life and to prevent what could otherwise become an even larger problem in the future.

Although the white coat ceremony that many medical schools and other health profession educational institutions conduct each year has a history of less than 30 years, it is becoming more widely regarded as a student rite of passage from general college studies to clinical education.
